The whole list of names, 45 in num-ber, having been exhausted, the court or-dered Sheriff U.a Pointe to assign a suffici-ent number of persons present in the court room, and it was not until half-past 3 that they were successful in forming one. The court then adourned till 10 a.m. to-morrow. It is not expected that the Viau trial will be completed before Monday, and then Sam Parslow's will immediately follow.
