YUKON TELEGRAPH LINE.

Charleson Thinks He Will Have Message Through Before the Year Clases. Victoria, B. C., May 5.-H. A. Munn of

the Victoria Yukon Trading Company, who has just returned from Lake Bennett, tells of great progress being made by the tele-graph builders. He says: "The telegraph construction party sent out by the Domin-ion Government, under Mr. J. B. Charleson, have lost no time in getting te work on the line to Dawson. The poles are already cut down as far as White Horse, and the wire will very soon be strung to Carlboo Cross-ing. Two camps are operating now. one which will drop down the river, keeping abreast of the work. The materials and supplies will be delivered on scows. Mr. Charleson is determined to have a message from Dawson before the close of the season of 1800.


