

THE YONGE-STREET STEAL. This case of the Metropolitan Railway is not the first time the Railway Committee of the Privy Council has exceeded its jurisdiction in dealing with municipalities. The orders of the committee are by no mean the courts in just the same way as are the actions of a municipality or any other pub-lic body. The Railway Committee is limited to the powers vested in it by Parlianent. Among those powers there cannot be found one permitting the committee to usurp the jurisdiction of the municipality in its streets, as it has assumed to do with respect to Toronto. Three or four years ago the City Council applied to the Railway Committee for crossings at Bathurst and Dufferin-streets where the C.P.R. crosses these highways. The C.P.R., the County of York and York Township were notified to appear before the Railway Committee. An order was made for the construction of a crossing, and the proportion of cost that each of the parties should bear was settled by the committee. Mr. C. C. Robinson, who appeared for the County of York, argued the point without waiving the county's right to dispute the jurisdiction of the Railway Committee. 
