When they wished to have a rearrangement of their charter, so as to take in a Vermont road, the legislature compelled them to give a two-cent rate. This forced all other roads between New York and Buffalo down to two cents. The Grand Trunk, by their charter, as shown by the member for East York in the Dominion house, were compelled to give a two-cent rate on some of their main lines. The Intercolonial give a three-cent rate for 50 miles and a two-cent rate to 400 miles or over. The government railway, the Temiskaming, should have a two-cent rate, so as to make it as cheap as possible for settlers to get in and out. So surely we can regulate the rate to two cents.

"Then, what will be the effect on freight? This is now in the hands of the railway commission at Ottawa, and we hope the public will be protected.

Taken Out of the Pablic.

"As regards taxation, whatever tax is put on the railroads by this house will be immediately taken out of the public. The only way we can protect the public is by making a deal with the roads. I noted at the time of the railway rate is two cents, so if it were applied to all roads it would be no hardship.
