MAKE SECOND PROPOSAL

Keystone Company Very Anxious to
Locate in Chatham.

The bylaw to grant a fixed assess-
ment and make a loan to the Keystone
Sugar Company (the firm which was
negotiating with London recently), will
be submitted to the people of Chatham
on July 20.

The Keystone Company's proposi-
tion, in a different form, was put before
the electors a few weeks ago, and by
them voted down by 150 votes. The
backers of the company were, how-
ever, anxious to have the company's
plant located there, because of the
many natural advantages, so another
proposal was made, in which it was
promised that the company would pay
half the cost of submitting the bylaw
to the electors to be given by the com-
pany to be guaranteed. This is held
to be a much better proposal than that
which was submitted before, and Ald.
Stone, of Chatham, who was one of
the most active opponents of the first
proposal, has decided this time to
leave the matter with the electors to
vote on, as their conscience and com-
mon sense dictates. Ald. Austin and
his friends, however, are working as
hard to pass it as they did the first
time, and this is said, with the
quiescence of the other opposition to
count very favorably in the matter.
There are those, however, who claim
that the bylaw will not receive as many
votes either way as it did before, and
that it will be as unceremoniously de-
feated as then.

WANTS TOWN TO HELP

North Midland Asks St. Marys to Guar-
antee \$500,000 Bonds.

The North Midland Railway Com-
pany is continuing its negotiations to
build a line to points north of London.
Mr. A. E. Welch, manager of the
North Midland, last night addressed the
council in regard to the company's
proposition, which was that the town
guarantee the payment of interest on
the bonds amounting to two-thirds of
the cost of the road. Mr. Welch fig-
ured that the road would cost \$750,000,
and he proposed that the town guaran-
tee interest on bonds amounting to
\$500,000.

Mr. Welch pointed out that he was
not asking for a bonus, but merely
for the town's backing. If the road
paid, the town council would not have
to put up a cent. The proposition was
referred to the railway committee.

store. Messrs. Young & Co. have pur-
chased the lease held by Messrs. Trot-
ter & Callan, and also the clothing sec-
tion of the business of the latter.
Together with their goodwill, it is their
intention to thoroughly renovate the
store and make it one of the most
modern in the city. Messrs. Young &
Co. have been engaged for many years
in the clothing and drygoods business
in London.

Messrs. Trotter & Callan retain
their boot and shoe business, and will
in all probability continue in this
business, although their plans are not
yet definitely settled. They have al-
ready secured temporary quarters.

CHURCHILL'S PROBLEM

8,000 Applicants for Ascot Royal En-
closure, But Only 1,800 Tickets.

London, June 27.—Last week we were
shivering from cold. Ascot's second day
found the thousands of fashionable as-
sembled there sweltering, for it was
the hottest day of the year, also the
longest. Lord Churchill is a man whose
position at this time of the year is none
too enviable. It is he who, under the
supervision of the King, has been giv-
ing out tickets for the royal enclosure,
and without those prized round red
plaques Ascot is as nothing to the so-
ciety woman.
The enclosure used to be much small-
er than it is now. Eighteen hundred
tickets are now issued, the price of
each being 4 sovereigns. But pity poor
Lord Churchill, for there were this year
no less than 8,000 applications, so that
6,200 applicants left bitterly disap-
pointed.

Mr. and Mrs. Longworth have had a
quiet time, such as must have been an
intense relief to them and the King on
the two occasions upon which the latter
has met the President's daughter. They
have been all that they could be
the way of affability and tact and
the lunch in the royal stand was one of
the merriest, the King being in those
high spirits which have characterized
him of late, and Mrs. Longworth was
full of life and animation. When the
luncheon ended she retired to the large
general royal enclosure, where she
formed the center of the American
coterie.

Mr. and Mrs. Longworth left Friday
for Kiel by invitation of the Kaiser,
and will doubtless have a much more
formal general reception than they have
had here, where all society is formed
into narrow cliques which even the
King cannot move to change their
ways.

This is not what would be called
the American season in London, yet
the new world show on the heath was
quite good. It was led by the Duchess
of Marlborough. She is recognized and
accepted as one of the best dressers in
London, and she lived up to her reputa-
tion. Her hand painted muslin of the
first day and delicate pink of the second
were stamped Paris all over.

Mrs. Adair, who almost has become
English from her long residence in this
country, brought over the greatest
beauty seen, Princess Teanoll, nee
Colonna, who is stopping with her at
Englefield. The princess looked lovely
in a black and white muslin.

Mrs. Adair was irreproachable in a
pink and white striped and Mrs. An-
thony Drexel in a white muslin with em-
broidery. She brought her pretty daughter,
Consuelo, Duchess of Manchester, who
presented each day, as were Mr. and Mrs.
Bradley Martin, Mr. and Mrs. Bonyne,
and Mrs. Lawrence Townsend, who
lunched with the King. Mrs. Chaucery
was looking a great beauty.

Morton Frewen and his pretty
daughter, Miss Clare, who came over
from Foxhill, where they were guests
of Sir Charles and Lady Rivers Wilson,
Miss Fink Mackay, and Mr. and Mrs.

Miss John Leslie and Miss Har-

OIL KING "GOLD BRICK"

Indianapolis Baptist Minister Talks
Harshly of J. D. Rockefeller.

Indianapolis, June 27.—Rev. L. D.
Bass, pastor of the South Street Baptist
Church and one of the well-known
ministers in that denomination, referred
in very uncompromising terms to John
D. Rockefeller in his sermon last night,
calling the oil magnate "the Baptist
gold brick."

"Mr. Rockefeller," he said, "would
form a trust on education. His plan,
through the University of Chicago, is to
have an affiliated college in every
state. What does that mean? That
we shall get our leading teachers from
the University of Chicago. That this
University shall mark out the course of
study, and thus give color to the in-
struction of our young people, not only
religiously, but politically. Is it safe
that one man educate our political lead-
ers?"

Rev. Mr. Bass then referred to a
negro in the East who is middle-aged
but has developed a strange disease,
causing him to grow taller. "There is
nothing remarkable about this sudden
change in stature," continued the min-
ister. "True, this negro is growing
larger, yet we have some great citizens
who are growing smaller under the
light thrown upon them by President
Roosevelt and others. We have no
technical name for 'growing smaller,'
although 'acromegaly' is given as the
technical name for unusual growth. Our
scientists should conjure up a name
for the disease that has so suddenly at-
tacked a lot of erstwhile big men and
reduced them to very diminutive size
in our eyes. The time has come, es-
pecially among Baptists, when we
should cease to worship the Baptist
gold brick Rockefeller and turn our at-
tention more to the poor Carpenter of
Nazareth."

Farewell of His Flock—
Death of a Pioneer.

Rev. Gustavus Munro and bride of

a son of Rev. Dr. Munro, of Bryanston,
a former pastor of Knox Presbyterian
Church here, and spent his boyhood in
this village. His friends here extend
their best wishes to both him and Mrs.
Munro.

Rev. Mr. Schofield, of Sheffield, oc-
cupied the pulpit of the Congregational
Church on Sunday. Mr. Schofield was
one of the delegates sent by the
