A number of regiments from different parts of Canada reached Quebec today to supplement the local forces.

The military decided to remove all firearms from all hardware stores following the raid on an establishment during the early hours of this morning. The firearms were taken to the Citadel.

The action of the military was resented by the mob faction and soldiers engaged in this task were pelted with missiles. In one case the rioters set a hardware store belonging to Martineau Bros. on fire. The mob was able to reach the store containing weapons before the soldiers and they broke it open. The premises raided belonged to Samson & Fillion.

MONSTER SHELLS OF NEW GERMAN CANNON RISE OVER 18 MILES Loaded Projectile Weighs 660 Pounds—Three Minutes On Journey.

Geneva, Switzerland, Saturday, March 30.—Lieut. Gen. von Rohne, a German officer on ordnance and inspector of artillery, gives in a magazine of the long-range gun which Paris is being bombarded. He says they are 20 metres (65½ feet) long. The empty shell weighs 150 kilograms (330 pounds), and the charge weighs the same. The projectile attains a height of 30 kilometres (18½ miles), and descends from the sky like a meteor on its target. The time taken for the shell to reach its destination is three minutes. The greatest difficulty in the way of increasing the range was overcome by sending the projectile high enough to reach the target.

Cardinal's Proclamation.

If we want Jesus Christ to pardon and bless us we must know how to make our conduct conform with the grave lessons which he preaches to us from his cross."

PARISHIONERS' MEN ALREADY ON WAY TO BATTLE LINE

Mile After Mile of Marching Troops Passing Through French Towns.

WASHINGTON IS THRILLED Lloyd George, Referring to Foch, Says Single Head Is Necessary.

PARIS, March 31.—"The French Government has decided to accede to the desire expressed by General Pershing in the name of the United States Government," says an official note issued today, dealing with the operation of American troops with the French and British.

"The American troops will fight side by side with the British and French troops, and the Star Spangled Banner will float beside the French and British flags in the plains of Picardy."

HOSTS ON THE MOVE.
WITH THE ARMIES IN FRANCE, Saturday, March 30.—(By Associated Press.)—All the American troops have been turned over to the Allies. They may soon be fighting side by side with the French and British troops in the battle raging in Northern France. Great activity of many sorts is under way in the whole American line. Trains of motor trucks, miles long, loaded with the Americans are passing through the towns. On other roads mile after mile of marching Americans are on the move.

WASHINGTON ELECTRIFIED.
WASHINGTON, March 31.—The foregoing announcement that American troops actually are on their way to the fighting lines to take place beside the British and French Allies sent a thrill throughout the national capital. It was the first positive statement that General Pershing's forces actually are on their way to the battle lines to help stem the tide of the German drive.

The American soldiers previously referred to the official dispatches as being in the fighting are believed to have been engineers or other auxiliary troops which probably were caught at their work as they were a few months ago at Cambrai, when the German suddenly enveloped parties of their forces behind their lines in a swift turning movement.

Over 100,000 of Them.
The sending of General Pershing's fighting troops to places in the British line has been expected by military experts to follow the creation of a unified command under the French chief of staff, General Foch, and General Pershing's formal offer of all the available American resources. Too much must not be said of the numbers and disposition of American troops in the battle zone for military reasons. It is no violation of the censorship to say that more than 100,000 American fighting troops, fully equipped and intensely trained in the school of actual battle conditions are available at once to be thrown into places to strengthen the British and French lines.

SINGLE COMMAND NEEDED.
LONDON, March 30.—Premier Lloyd George today announced the appointment of General Foch as commander of the Allied armies on the western front. In making the announcement the premier said:

"For the first few days after the German army had launched upon our front an attack unparalleled in the concentration of troops and guns, the situation was extremely critical.
