

KING OF GAZUM WANTS TEACHERS

Promises That He Will Not Eat
Any of Them if They Go
to West Africa.

Philadelphia, Sept. 12.—The King of the Gazum wants teachers, preferably young men with college education, refinement of manners, pleasant address, and a fair knowledge of medicine and plant life. He wants them as soon as possible, and he thinks he is offering a golden opportunity to youths with ambitions to become famous in West Africa. To those who will join the monarch's household and seek to instruct his adherents the best habitation in the land of the Gazum, the finest of the cattle, and, in brief, the best that can be furnished him, will be given. The monarch is extremely generous with his liberal means and the pay will be very liberal. The king, however, is a cannibal, and he is having considerable difficulty in obtaining men to fill the jobs. Information about the positions is given by Charles Kurtzball, of No. 323 East Walnut lane, Germantown. Mr. Kurtzball is the secretary of the Society for the Mission and is thoroughly familiar with the Northern Nigeria country. Several years ago he met the King of the Gazum. The king told him that it was true that he occasionally feasted on human flesh, and was surprised to learn that his favorite dish was never served at any of the banquets in the white man's country.

The king, however, stated that it was seldom that he ate any young persons, but always served the aged and sick persons. There are no cemeteries in the land of the Gazum.

"It would be a pity to waste the meat," said the king to Mr. Kurtzball. The land of the Gazum is situated in the heart of Northern Nigeria, which is now under the domination of the English. He is a powerful monarch within his realm, but, excepting his cannibal tastes, is said to be a kindly disposed king.

RYNE ON TEXTBOOKS

Education Minister Tells of English Method.

Toronto, Sept. 11.—Hon. Dr. Ryne, minister of education, was in his office at the educational department at 10 o'clock this morning, apparently fresh and prepared for work after his old country trip.

Although his outing was primarily for pleasure, the minister took occasion to look into the textbook question while abroad. He conversed with members of boards of education, and learned that about fifty different sets of textbooks were in use in the British Isles. Instead of the textbooks being prescribed from a central source, as is done in Ontario, each board had the privilege of selecting its own books.

This scheme had one advantage, Dr. Ryne thought, and this was that it relieved the central educational authorities of the responsibility of choosing textbooks. The Minister of Education hinted that the Ontario educational department might regard such relief as timely, under certain circumstances.

He arranged with London, Edinburgh and Dublin to have sample textbooks sent to him, with equipment for elementary schools, and for secondary education, similar to Ontario's collegiate institutions and high schools.

The idea is to submit them to the commission on textbooks for purposes of comparison. In determining the textbook question, the minister said the Government would be guided largely by the advisory council that is to be elected this fall, under the new act.

MURDERER HAUNTS PARSON

He Says Ghost of Man Gives Him Rheumatism.

Baltimore, Sept. 11.—To being haunted by the spirit of Isaac Winder, the negro murderer, who was hanged at Towson last March, and whose spiritual adviser he was at the time, Rev. J. B. Amis, pastor of St. Matthew's Colored Baptist Church, ascribes his falling health. The clergyman called on Marshall Farnan to obtain a permit for a Sunday school parade. While in the marshal's office he asked permission to examine a number of photographs of criminals and the scenes of their crimes which adorned the walls. This was granted, and, as Amis caught sight of a picture of Winder he literally exploded.

"For de lan's sakes, don't lemme look at dish yer picture! It's dat like Winder, an' he's de cause uh mah rheumatiz. Dat yer like Winder done ha'n't me ever since dey hung him at Towson. Lemme git outer hyah!" and the pastor hobbled on his crutches to the other side of the room.

"Dish yer rheumatiz done caused by Winder," he explained. "He done come tuh me at night an' run hi co' hands over mah face, an' I hears him breathin' hard, jes' as he did dat day at Towson. One night he come and run his hands over mah face, an' I feel jes' like spiddah webs, only co'ser, and den he re'ch down and pull every sitch up bedder' often me. How did I know 'twas de Winder? Huh! I ain' bin studyin' de Scriptures fo' nothin'!"

FATAL ACCIDENT IN SARNIA TUNNEL

Wm. S. Frank, a G. T. R. Section
Boss, Crushed to Death—
Sister Lives Here.

A sad accident occurred Monday afternoon in the Sarnia Tunnel, by which William S. Frank, a bright young employee of the G. T. R. Company, met instant death. Mr. Frank was section foreman of the tunnel yard, and of the Sarnia and Point Edward yards, and during Monday Mr. Frank and his men were doing repair work in the tunnel. Numerous trains passed through while the men were at work, but everything went well until the afternoon local passenger train was being taken west through the tunnel. The men saw the train approaching and all got out of the way except the foreman. He was the last man to leave the work, and as he turned to ascend the side of the tunnel he slipped. The big engine No. 1303 was proceeding backwards, and as Mr. Frank slipped the footboards on the engine caught him and hurled him to his death. Both legs were broken at the ankle and the back of his head was crushed in. The unfortunate young man was picked up by his comrades and carried to the tunnel pump-house, where the body was viewed by Coroner Dr. Hayes, who ordered an inquest. Deceased was 32 years old, and had been a resident of Sarnia for over four years, going there from Komoka. He resided on south Brock street, where his mother, Mrs. John Frank, kept house for him. The funeral will be held from his late residence, 413 south Brock street, this afternoon, and the remains will be taken to Komoka on the 2:10 p.m. express for interment.

William S. Frank is survived by his mother and five brothers and sisters: Richard Frank and Mrs. George Wilcox, Komoka; Mrs. J. L. Parker, Union, and Miss Annie Frank, of this city. He was a general favorite and his death will be sincerely regretted by all.

BRIDGE CONTRACTS

Montreal Firms Likely to Get Those
Levis to La Tuque.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—The contracts for the eight steel bridges on the eastern section of the transcontinental railway between Levis and La Tuque will doubtless be divided between the Dominion Bridge Company and the Locomotive and Machine Company, of Montreal, as they are the lowest tenderers. The former will erect bridges at Bascam, Jacques Cartier, Riviere Charest and the C. P. R. crossing in Portneuf County for a sum amounting to about \$100,000.

The latter company for about \$80,000 will construct bridges at Riviere Noire, Riviere aux Pommes, Ste. Anne and Portneuf.

INSURANCE COMMISSION

Former Manager of the Home Life
on the Stand.

Toronto, Sept. 11.—At this morning's session of the Insurance commission the examination of Mr. A. J. Pattison, former manager of the Home Life, was continued.

The inquiry asked as to differences between certain contracts that Mr. Pattison, as manager, had with the Home Life. The witness said that in 1898 he had given up a contract, which brought him \$2,600 a year for one which netted him only \$1,200. He did this because the company had changed to a level premium system and could not afford to pay the larger commission. He thought it better to revise the contract so that the salary would be bigger when the company's business attained larger proportions.

The charges in the contracts and the appointment of a permanent chairman were made up on the recommendations of a committee composed of Messrs. John Phillips, Fred Diver, and John S. King. Only five directors, including the manager and the permanent secretary, were present at the meeting when the report was confirmed.

When the amalgamation with the People's life was discussed, Hon. J. R. Stratton came to him and asked him to sell his interest. The witness had computed the probable revenue of the company for the balance of the term of the contract and found that he would receive approximately \$80,000. The estimate of the actuary of the Home Life was a little larger than his own. Mr. Stratton, who Mr. Pattison said received \$11,500 cash for the surrender of his contract, in addition to the sale of his stock for \$3,375 out of the \$80,000, complained that he did not get full value for his contract.

FOR THE OPEN SHOP

Toronto Piano Manufacturers Have
Issued an Ultimatum.

Toronto, Sept. 11.—That the piano manufacturers are determined not to accede to the demands of the men on strike is evidenced by the following letter, a copy of which was received by each of the striking piano workers this morning from the various firms:

"Dear Sir,—Having absented yourself from your position in our factory without leave, you are hereby notified that you have forfeited your situation. The piano firms have decided on the following regulations with regard to the future employment of men.

"1. To maintain an 'open shop'.

"2. Not to enter into any agreement which provides for the discharge of any person employed at the time of the settlement of any strike declared in the factories.

"Should you wish to re-enter our services under the new conditions it is necessary that you should apply at our factory before Thursday, Sept. 13. Failing such application for renewal of employment you are hereby notified that you must remove your tools, etc., from our factory on or before that date."

An Incomparable Display of Canadian Live Stock

Splendid Specimens of Horses, Sheep, Swine, Poultry
Etc., at the Western Fair.

HORSES.

The horse stables at the Western are, as usual, very full, all the prominent breeders in Ontario having exhibits. Space is reserved for the King's shire horses, which will very likely arrive today. At Toronto these animals attracted large crowds, and no doubt will do so here.

In the Clydesdale class the 4-year-old stallion Acme, owned by Dr. Sorley, Guelph, was a beautiful specimen and admired by many. Dalgety, of London, exhibited a large number, and received awards in the 2-year-old class. There are very few shires on exhibit, but Hamilton & Hawthorne, of Simcoe, are showing very fine Percherons.

The exhibit of hackneys is very large this year. Warwick Model, the 4-year-old bay stallion, owned by O. Sorley, Guelph, easily carried off premier honors out of a large class, also winning the English Hackney Horse Society silver medal. Lankdon Tilly, a beautiful 3-year-old mare from the same stable, carried premier honors and the silver medal.

The saddle horses and hunters were strong. Adam Beck winning both heavy and light weight in the hunter class. The carriage and coach class is strong as usual. Mr. A. St. Clair, of Almyer, carried off premier honors with his beautiful black stallion, Jubilee Chief. Although this horse is some 18 years old he still maintains a good form and acts just like a youngster. Plenty of good mares were also shown in this class, prizes falling to W. H. Orr, Glanworth, and H. Zinn, Listowel.

SHEEP.

The sheep pens were full this year, many of the prominent breeders coming straight from the exhibition in Toronto.

In the Lincolns, Patrick, of Iderton, carried off all the prizes, which he also did at Toronto. He has sheep much above the average in the class. Arkell & Son, of Arkell, have some fine Oxfordshires, prize winners at the Royal show this year.

The Southdowns were well represented by Telfer Bros., Paris, and Robert McEwen, Byron.

In the Shropshires, Lloyd Jones, Burford, was the chief prize winner. In this class the sheep shown were very fine.

Hastings Bros. and J. Woolcott, Mitchell, were strong in the Leicester class. The sheep exhibit is well up to the average this year, with a large number of imported animals.

SWINE.

The exhibit of swine is considered very good this year, as compared with previous years. All the space allotted for this exhibit is fully taken up, and every breed is represented.

In the large English Yorkshires, D. C. Platt & Son, of Millgrove, have a large exhibit, having come from Toronto, where they carried off many prizes. Joseph Featherston, of Streetsville, is also a large exhibitor in the same class. The pigs in this class were exceptionally good, showing what great care is being taken to produce good bacon.

In the Berkshires W. H. Durham, of Toronto, has a large exhibit, and carried off nine out of ten first prizes. This speaks well for Mr. Durham, as one look at his herd shows what care and judgment he is exercising in breeding.

The Chester White pigs were exhibited by Mr. De Courcy, of Bornholm. W. E. Wright, of Glanworth, also had a nice lot in this class. The Tamworths and also a few Poland Chinas were exhibited, but the class was not strong.

POULTRY EXHIBIT.

The Poultry Building is overcrowded this year. London and its vicinity are noted for their chicken fanciers, and they have given their neighbors a chance of seeing what they have this year. Without London exhibitors, any poultry show in Canada would not amount to very much. Besides, London men there is a large number of outside breeders.

The pigeon exhibit is the best that has been seen in London for fifteen years. The number of birds in this class amounts to 428.

Mr. D. J. Vrooman, city, has an extra fine exhibit in Short-faced and Muffed Tumblers. All the other breeds are well represented, and close competition existed in every class.

In chickens, Mr. L. C. Sage took everything in Dark and Light Brahmas, while W. H. Beattie exhibited very fine Bronze turkeys. Every breed of chicken, large or small, is well represented, being exhibited by well-known London men too numerous to mention.

Two lonely pheasants are exhibited. It seems almost a pity to keep such beautiful birds in close confinement.

DAIRY BUILDING.

The Dairy Building is always an attraction for those interested in the manufacture of good butter and cheese. The firms manufacturing cream separators have the center of the building, and pretty near every firm selling separators in Ontario has an exhibit. They all say that "theirs" is the best, but it remains for the buyer to judge.

The cheese exhibit is very good, although not coming up to that of last year. In white factory cheese first prize was awarded to Miss Mary Morrison, of Newry, while first prize fell to W. Hamilton, Listowel, for colored factory cheese.

The butter exhibit is very large, and

some of the samples shown look very tempting, being done up nicely, with parchment paper bearing the maker's name and address.

For crock butter, J. O. Cutler, Poplar Hill, received first prize; farm dairy butter, one-pound prints, Miss M. Johnson, Bowood; creamery, one-pound prints, F. E. Brown, Dutton; creamery, 50-pound box, F. E. Brown, Dutton.

The samples do not quite come up to last year, owing to the very dry summer, which we have had in most parts.

The dairy competition, open to all, takes place in this building daily between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. Cream is supplied free of charge, but the but-ter made is the property of the association.
