

The labor organizations of Sydney, N. S., have been doing splendid work towards granting assistance to the grief-stricken sufferers of the great Halifax disaster. W. Wilkie, president of the New Brunswick Federation of Labor, immediately upon receipt of the news pledged organized labor to liberally contribute towards the assistance of the sufferers. Three hundred dollars were immediately donated by the union workers in the Sydney mines, and since then hundreds of dollars additional have been sent for relief work, to which the union men of the district have contributed willingly.
