Cost About \$90,000.

The engineer submitted a report on the subject of sanitary sewers for Knollwood Park. The report stated that, in order to do what is really necessary to provide proper drainage for that section of the city, an expenditure of between \$85,000 and \$95,000 would have to be shouldered. This would work out at about 45 cents or 50 cents a foot frontage a year for ten years for the propertyholders, while the city's proportion of the cost would be about 30 per cent of the total. 
