Olympic Boxing Results

Foreigners Fared Badly

Bouts Lasted All Day Before Big Crowd in London—Summary of Events.

The boxing competitions in connection with the Olympic games proved a great attraction at the Northampton Institute, London, Oct. 27, the big hall being crowded all day. Many of the 50 competitors entered failed for various reasons to turn up, but enough were left to provide a long day's sport. Boxers from France, Denmark, Australia, England, Scotland and the Englishmen, as was expected, carried all before them. Proceedings commenced just after 11.30, and boxing went on until 4.30. From the first the continental competitors fared very badly, and when the interval arrived they had all been knocked out. Indeed, the only boxer entered from the second rounds was R. L. Baker of Australia, in the middleweights, and H. Roddin of Scotland in the featherweights. In the first two fights of the day two Danes were put out of the running, following in the second round was the London Post's concise summary:—

First Round—
J. Condon (Lynn A.C.) beat P. Mazior (France).
W. Webb (St. Pancras B.C.) beat H. Perry (Columbia A. & B.C.).

Condon beat Webb. Using his left with beautiful effect and often countering in the style Condon gained a victory over a much more experienced and stronger opponent.

Final—Thomas beat Condon. A very correct and interesting fight throughout. There was little in the matter until the last round, when Thomas was a little stronger. Both men were loudly cheered.

Morris beat Roddin. The Scotchman, as in the first round, fought with fine determination, but found Morris, who won on points, too clever for him.

Final—Gunn beat Morris. Gunn began nicely with some straight leads and his arm body blows, and Morris at one time looked to be weakening. However, he took all that and was very steady and with some effective blows. Both were fighting to the end, but Gunn had enough in hand to win.
