AGREE TO ACCEPT HARD COAL AWARD, BUT UNDER PROTEST

Mining Scale Committee Will, However, Formulate New Demands.

DRAW UP CONTRACT

Hazleton, Penna., Sept. 1.—The scale committee of the United Mine Workers of America representing the three hard coal districts, late today agreed to accept the award of the anthracite coal commission under protest, and follow this up with the presentation of new demands.

The miners' committee will meet the representatives of the operators in Scranton tomorrow in pursuance of a call issued by Secretary of Labor, W. B. Wilson, for the purpose of writing the terms of the award into a two-year contract. When the operators are willing to sign the contract in the face of the large suspension of mining as a protest against the terms of the award was not known here tonight.

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HEAVILY SCREENED TROLLEY CARS RUN DESPITE STRIKERS

Break in Brooklyn Rapid Transit Strike Is Now in Sight.

POLICE ATTACK MOBS

New York, Sept. 1.—First intimation that a break in the Brooklyn rapid transit strike may soon be in sight came today, the fourth day of the walk-out, when five thousand carmen in mass meeting authorized their leaders to seek negotiations for settlement on the basis of a "voluntary increase" in wages by the company.

Several Clashes Reported. Developments of the day included sporadic clashes between strikers and non-striker police. Police reserves reported an attack of 300 strikers and sympathizers on one car barn.

South Brooklyn was the scene of numerous clashes between the police and strikers this afternoon and tonight, in which the bluecoats used their clubs to suppress disorder.

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TWENTY-FIVE DEAD IN BELFAST RIOTING SNIPERS STILL BUSY

Military Are Badly Handicapped by Friendly Onlookers Who Cross Line of Fire—Attempt to Attack Catholic Church Repulsed With Rifle Fire and Several Are Wounded.

Belfast, Sept. 1.—The troubles in Belfast today resolved themselves into sniping on an extensive scale. Only the Ballymacarrett district was not affected. The worst spot was in North street.

This evening the military dashed along Gresham street, which abuts on North street, in pursuit of a man who was alleged to have fired on them from close range. The troops are being hampered by the curiosity of friendly onlookers, who persist in getting across their line of fire.

An attempt to attack a Catholic church in Alfred street tonight resulted in an exchange of shots lasting for half an hour. Several persons were wounded before the military dispersed the combatants.

DROP NOT CERTAIN IN PRICE OF BREAD, SAY LOCAL BAKERS

They Explain That They Must Await Definitely Cheaper Flour.

BAKERS WELL STOCKED

The price of bread to the Toronto consumer may be lowered before many weeks, but the local bakers, despite a Montreal report that bread prices here will be cut about the end of the month, are not sure that prices will be lowered at all this fall.

Hope of cheaper bread has been strongly roused by the announcement that new crop flour for shipment from the west is being quoted at \$2.15 a barrel, as against a previous quotation of \$2.45, but the baker mentioned said that he would like to see some more support.

However, a more cheerful view from the consumer's side is taken by C. E. Watt, secretary-treasurer of the Dominion Millers' Association, who was a member of the wheat board until it ceased to function. He said yesterday that the drop in flour announced by millers in Montreal was equivalent to one cent a loaf on the price of bread.

Warsaw, Sept. 1.—Continued fighting in the region of Zamość, 45 miles southeast of Lublin, is reported by Polish official communique issued yesterday.

The northern wing of the Polish army is reported to be advancing without resistance. It has captured Grodek, says the statement, taking more than 1,000 prisoners.

A group of Red detachments operating east of Chelm for the purpose of supporting General Budenny's cavalry, were repulsed with heavy loss when it attempted to take the approach by attacking the Poles in the district between Dublince and Montacy.
