OXFORD CHANCES IMPROVE FOR NEXT WEEK'S BOAT RACE

London, March 23.—(By Can. Associated Press)—The bad luck which dogged the Oxford crew in the early days of their training for the annual boat races with Cambridge seems now to have deserted them, and to have shifted to the light blues of Oxford, which for weeks could not decide on a stroke, and when it did was D. T. Raikes, lost him for several days owing to muscle strain, has been doing some

On Monday it covered the full race course from Putney to Mortlake, four and a quarter miles, in the good time of 20 minutes 9 seconds. Yesterday it did the section of the course in record time, Cambridge's best time for the course so far has been 21 minutes 58 seconds. It can be pointed out that on Monday Oxford enjoyed better conditions than those prevailing when Cambridge made the test.

Last week Cambridge was without the services of its regular No. 7, Hon. J. W. H. Freemantle, owing to sickness. Mr. Freemantle has returned to the boat, but his ability to keep up training and to row in the race were today considered matters of some doubt.

The fine performances of Oxford and the possibility of fine changes in the Cambridge crew are considered by rowing experts to have lessened, if not to have wiped out, the advantage the light blue secured in setting the crew together more
