

The decrease may be attributed to the large donations to the building fund, and it is confidently anticipated that the diminution in income is only temporary. Subscriptions show a decrease of \$3,305.75. The other chief item of decrease is paying patients, \$4,072.20. There have been received in legacies during the year: Estate Mrs. George Armstrong, \$254; Estate Major Mackenzie, \$439; Estate James Burnett, \$2,000; Estate William Adams, \$90; Estate Miss Mary Jane Tatlow, \$62.20; Estate Mrs. A. Stuart, \$5,585.97.

The total number of indoor patients treated to a conclusion during the year was 2,342, a decrease of 395 against last year. Of these 153 remained over from the preceding year, and 2,300 were admitted during the year 1894-5, the most active period being the quarter of May, June and July; 138 patients remained in hospital at the end of the year.

Of the above deaths 80 occurred within three days of their admission.

The average number of patients in the wards during the year was 152, a decrease of 36 against last year. The average number of days in Hospital per patient was 24. The aggregate number of days in Hospital by all patients was 56,706, a decrease of 9,296 days over last year.
