### POULTRY DISEASE INVESTIGATOR

(Experimental Farm Note)  
It will be of interest to poultry keepers throughout Canada to know that there is now an expert who devotes all his time investigating the diseases of poultry. Dr. A. B. Wickware, assistant pathologist to the health of animals branch, has been assigned to that work by Dr. Torrance, veterinary director-general.

Wickware is by no means a novice in poultry diseases. For several years, under Dr. Higgins, Dominion pathologist, he has devoted some of his time to the diseases affecting poultry and has given special attention to Black Head. Realizing the importance of investigations in poultry diseases, J. H. Grialde, director of experimental farms and Dr. Torrance arranged for Dr. Wickware to take up this question exclusively.

It is therefore now co-operating with the poultry division, Central Experimental Farm, where, since last fall, he has been conducting experiments along this much needed and very important line of work.

Continued attention is being given to Black Head in turkeys and many new investigations are being started. These relate to chick diseases as well as to general diseases of poultry, including parasites of all kinds.

The annual losses that occur from poultry diseases and parasites are tremendous. No person knows what the amount is, but it is well into the millions of dollars each year. Dr. Wickware's work will no doubt, do something to eliminate part of this, but the cooperation of all poultrymen who have any disease in their flock will be appreciated.

As usual, communications to the Experimental Farm re diseases of poultry will be welcomed and with Dr. Wickware's work now giving all his time to this matter, even more information will be available. Specimens of sick poultry should be sent when practicable and will be expressed collect if addressed to Biographical Laboratory, Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

### ALLIES' FOOD RULES TO GUIDE HOOVER IN FRAMING U. S. CODE

Regulations Probably Will Be Less Stringent Than Those of Great Britain  
Washington, May 29—Food regulations of the Allies, which probably will furnish the basis for somewhat similar rules in the United States, are being assembled by the government.  
American regulations probably will be less stringent, but this is not deterring Herbert C. Hoover, selected for food administrator, and other officials from giving careful study to the codes of other warring nations.  
Here are some of the more striking British regulations:  
For public meals the allowance of meat is based on an average of five ounces for each luncheon and dinner and two ounces for each breakfast served on non-meatless days.  
Tuesdays are meatless days in London and Wednesday elsewhere in the kingdom.  
Potatoes must not be served except on meatless days and Fridays.
