**The Government's Duty**

(Toronto Globe.)

A change of government will be justified only by a change for the better. Candid friends of the late administration will admit that it was not riotous or popular. The highly critical state of the public mind has not been charmed away by cabinet changes. Having lost faith in the old government, people look to the new one with hope, but not with a boundless charity. It has a stock of goodwill which its predecessors lost, but this will not serve it long unless it is justified by its works.

Many faults were imputed to the Borden government, but it was attacked chiefly on the ground that it was too dependent on large financial and industrial interests, or too fearful of them, to compel them to carry their proportionate share of the burdens of the war and subordinate their selfish interests to the service of the country. The present government can better afford to be courageous; it cannot afford to be anything else. Its first duty must be to strike at the cause of popular discontent by demonstrating that it has the intention and the will to lay a firm hand on the machinery of big business, and make it work for the state. The war has poured fortunes into the pockets of many great industrial and distributing enterprises. Some of these have been lately placed under direct government control, but there is need of widely extending state regulation in the interest of the public exchequer and of the masses. Fiscal reforms are necessary, especially a stiffening of the new income tax, and direct imposts on luxuries. It cannot have escaped the notice of the minister of finance that the amended income tax in the United States will touch a greater number of people, relatively, than the corresponding tax in Canada, and that the larger American incomes derived from professions and occupations will pay double the Canadian rate.

Above and beyond these things the government can do much to curb extravagance and stimulate thrift. It can be not only economical itself, but the cause of economy in others. A great many people must be shaken out of their present habits of spending. It is difficult to modify custom in a hurry. But Canadians must be made to realize that they face an industrial emergency. The amount of money needed to market the crops and establish British credits so as to keep factories busy and labor employed on British war orders will be beyond the resources of the country unless the people are smitten with a zeal for saving. One way in which the government can aid in this laudable object is to change, as far as practicable, the direction of industry. The employment of more labor and material in the production of essentials would reduce their price. This can be effected only by the transfer of labor and material from the production of the non-essentials on which too many Canadians are spending money that should be invested in war bonds so as to keep essential industries at work. In the realm of food control and regulation the government, through the food controller, must do much farther in plans for conserving and distributing supplies, for stimulating production, and for protecting the public against speculators and profiteers.

The country looks for a bold and progressive programme from the new government as a justification for union. The Globe believes that the administration will prove that it is not a mere office-holding combination, and will do big things now that it is unfettered by party and patronage considerations.
