**LIKELY NOW IN FRANCE**

Mrs. P. L. Jennings, of East St. John, is just in receipt of a letter from her son, Gunner Edward Jennings, who left here with No. 7 Siege Battery, from Bristol, England. It contained the information that the battery, which was now the 167th, was to leave England for France soon after the date of writing. This would mean that they are now in France.

**GET TOGETHER SERVICES**

The first of a series of "get together" services being held this week in the Methodist Episcopal church, West End, under the auspices of The Young People's Society, was held last evening, a large number being present. Rev. Gilbert Earle gave an excellent address on "Missions as a Field for Service." The president of the society, J. Ronald Carlin, presided.

**IN HOSPITAL IN MALTA; DOWN WITH MALARIAL FEVER**

Staff Sergeant McMenamon of New Street Writes Home to Mother

Mrs. Charles McMenamon of 211 New Street, received a letter on Saturday from her son, Staff Sergeant Thomas who is in a hospital in Malta recovering from a severe attack of malarial fever. He left St. John with a medical unit attached to the first Canadian contingent in England some months ago and remained for a short time. He was then sent to the Dardanelles and later transferred to Saloniki, Greece.

Some weeks ago he contracted fever and was placed on board a ship which was to take him back to England, but for some unknown reason was landed at Malta. He said he would give a lot to be home for just two weeks and then he would willingly return for another couple of years.

While in this city Sergeant McMenamon was employed at the various firms. He has a host of friends who will unite in wishing him a speedy recovery.

**FOR THE RETURNED WOUNDED SOLDIERS**

An excellent opportunity will be given the citizens tomorrow afternoon to hear something of what is being done and to be done for returned wounded soldiers. Col. Thompson of the Returned Soldiers Commission, with Col. Staples in the city in connection with matters relating to returned soldiers, and Col. Thompson has accepted an invitation to speak at the Soldiers' Club tomorrow afternoon at half past three, on the welfare of returning soldiers. This is a subject concerning which there is much discussion, and the citizens should embrace the present opportunity to hear Col. Thompson and to ask any questions that may occur to them. Ladies as well as gentlemen are invited and it is hoped there will be a large attendance. Lt.-Col. McVitty will take the chair.

**NEW BATTALION IS BUSY AT ARMOY**

The army is once again the scene of military activities and from the officers down all were busy this morning making ready their quarters for the coming winter.

The officers' quarters are not yet in readiness and Lieut. D'Aigle and other officers are at the Victoria.

It will be a few days yet before the battalion gets down to routine work. Lt.-Col. D'Aigle expects to be able to fill his unit in a very short time. A few members of the 140th and 148th battalions, now overseas, had been transferred to the 160th, having been medically unfit when their respective units sailed.

**POLICE COURT.**

Joseph King was fined \$16 for being drunk in the I. C. R. station and using profane language. I. C. R. Policeman Roberts testified.

Louis Dumphy, of the Field Ambulance Corps, was again before the court, this time on charge of wandering about Water street at three o'clock this morning and not answering satisfactorily the questions of a policeman. Peter Weley, a sailor, on charge of lying and lurking in a hall way at an early hour this morning, was fined \$5 which was allowed to stand, as his captain was willing to take him back to the ship again.

Another individual, arrested on charges of drunkenness and loitering around the station, told the court that he had authoritative papers from Ottawa to give him permission to be where he was when arrested. The papers were produced and apparently looked O. K. He was remanded as he wished to get witnesses to prove further who he was and the mission that he is on for the government.
