Ottawa, June 18-The Canadians have again been on the firing line. The ! Ottawa, June 18—The Canadians have again been on the firing line. The first brigade, according to advices received here today, has been in an engagement and sustained losses. The location of the battle is not given out. It is presumed that it was at Festeburt, where, according to Sir John French, one line of German trenches was taken and a second taken in part, though subsequently the ground had to be yielded.

The first brigade under General Mercer is made up of the first, second, third and fourth battalions, and is exclusively from Ontario.

Col. Becher of London has been officially reported killed. He was with the first battalion, in which the losses were heaviest. There were also casualties in the second battalion. Captain Willis O'Connor of Ottawa, who was attached to the second battalion, is wounded. He was an officer in the militia department here.


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

NEED OF WAR MUNITIONS MONCTON TO HAVE

Glasgow, June 18—"We have returned from the front, determined to do our best to persuade our fellow workmen to do their best to turn out munitions at top speed," is the message a party of skilled craftsmen have brought back after a visit to the British forces in Flanders, where every opportunity was afforded them to see the war in all its stages.

The result apparently has justified the unique experiment undertaken by a large firm engaged in the production of ammunition here, which found that its output was falling considerable short of the capacity of the plant. The firm, convinced that its employes were not giving their best services, obtained permission from the government to send eight of its men to France to see for themselves the conditions under which the British army is fighting.

According to the men's report, hundreds of soldiers and officers i interviewed by them in the trenches and elsewhere, pleaded without exception for more shells.

"They now return as war missionaries," said a member of the firm, "and I am satisfied that the result will be a great help to our output."
