G. A. He said last night that the car, which is a seven-passenger one, skidded in the gravel, hit a rock and went over the embankment, turning completely over so that its wheels were in the air. He thought he had been traveling at about 80 miles an hour at the time of the ac-

FIVE WOMEN IN CAR.

The accident occurred at the foot of Vinegar Hill after the car had made the turn at the foot. The hill is not the turn at the foot. The hill is not very steep but is a very long one. Of the eight passengers five were women. The passengers included Miss Amy Sullivan, of St. Stephen, and Miss Olive Henry, of Ottawa, who were going to St. Stephen, and who were taken on to their destination by Mr. Boone, of St. Stephen, whose car arrived at the scene of the scrident most rived at the scene of the accident most opportunely. The C. W. Connors car, en route for St. George, picked up the passengers for that section and took them safely to their destination.

MANY RUMORS.

There were many exaggerated ru mors concerning the seriousness of the mishap and the report was circulated that there had been seven people killed. The facts of the case as far as they could be learned last night were that Mr. Anderson was the chief sufferer and it was feared might have had a rib broken. The car was not very badly damaged and was able to get to St. Stephen under its own power, arriving only about two hours after its schedule only about two hours after its schedule time. The car was in use yesterday. Mr. Dean, of Musquash, assisted in rescuing the passengers and in getting the car right side up again.

He said last night that he had been alarmed at the rate of speed at which the car was driven. He had been occupying the jump seat behind the driver; three women were on the back seat, two woman

Mr. Anderson said as the car had skidded off the road it had struck a large rock, which it shoved ahead of it for about 20 feet before it overturned. When it came to a standstill it was about 45 yards off the road and had gone six feet down the embankment. gone six feet down the embankment.

The passengers were got out without very much difficulty. One of the women was unconscious and at first it was feared that she had been killed but as it happened one of the passengers was a doctor and he was able to give necessary first aid. The injured woman had nothing more serious than a clight out nothing more serious than a slight cut on the head and some bruises.
