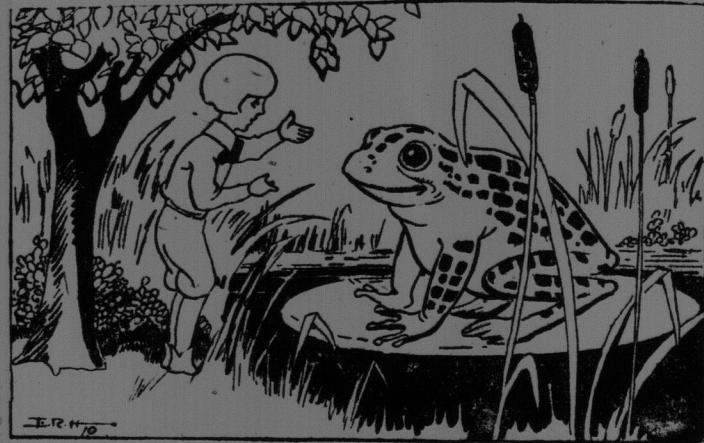

"All right, mammy," they answered. "Here we are. We'll hold as still as ever we can."

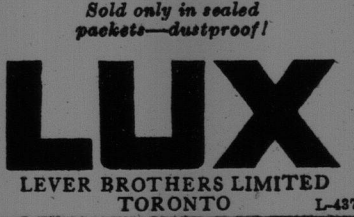

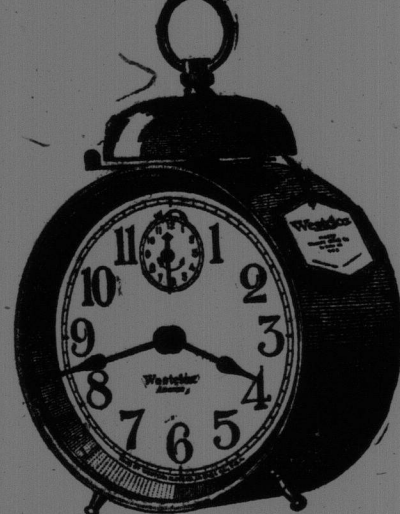
Three special speakers were heard in various churches and in other churches the pastors gave special sermons. Rev. Thomas Marshall, secretary of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance, was the preacher in St. David's Presbyterian church in the morning, and would have spoken in the Exmouth street Methodist church in the evening but his health did not permit, and his place was taken by Rev. F. T. Bertram of the Carleton Methodist church.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, former secretary of the Alliance, and former chief liquor inspector in New Brunswick, spoke in St. Andrew's church in the morning, and addressed the Sunday school of the Coburg street church of the Disciples of Christ, in the afternoon, and was the preacher in the Carleton Methodist church in the evening. Rev. T. D. Fighting a Cold

"Once a cold has been contracted the rules for prevention should be reversed."

"It is then advisable to avoid drafts, various fluctuating temperatures and skin exercises."

"The great idea then is to keep the body warm, and the feet in particular. A hot footbath is a good thing right off the bat, then a hot drink, then a good

purgative and a good rubbing of neck and chest with camphorated oil.

"When the footbath is being taken it's a good idea to wrap the body in a blanket and then immediately go to bed. A bath with water at 85 to 100 degrees is restful to the nerves and skin."

"Eat lightly, preferably vegetables. And, afterward, build up the body and skin to avoid recurrence."

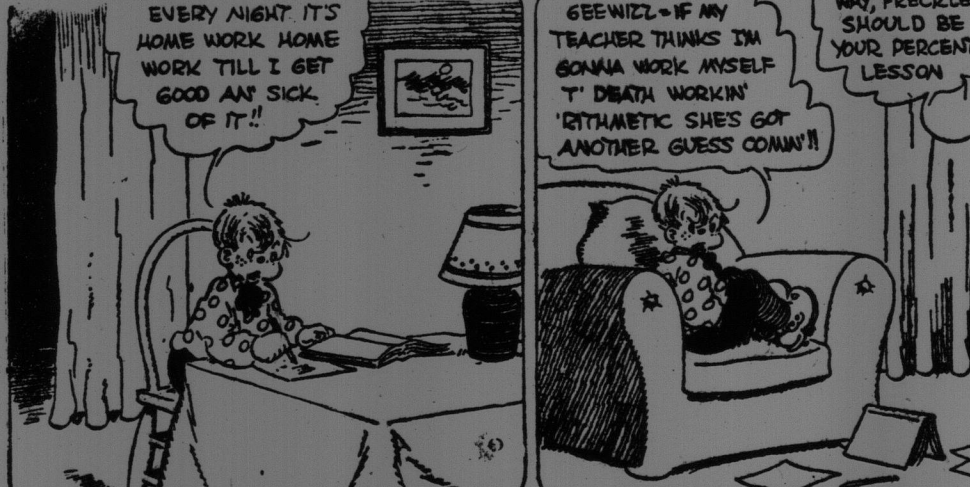

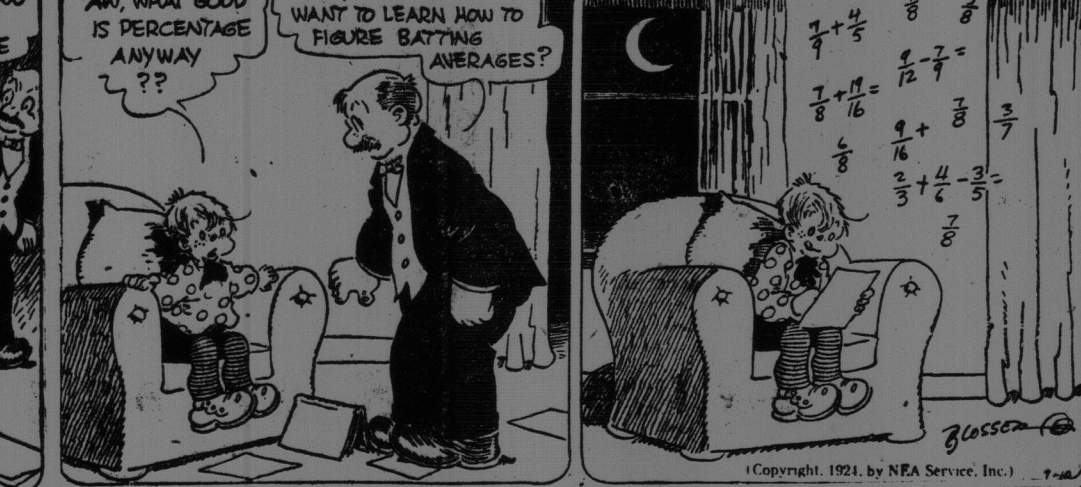

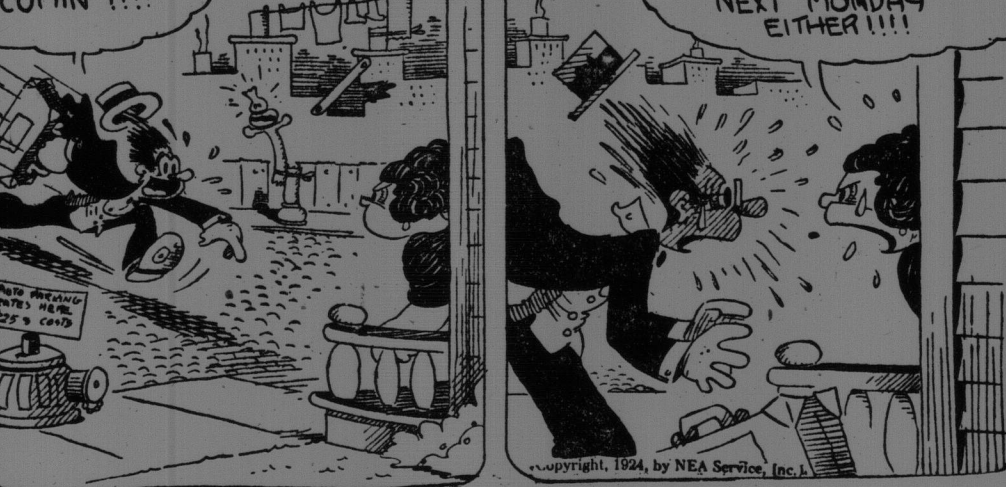
