

MIDNIGHT REVEL ENDS IN MURDER

Celebration Punctuated by a
Fusillade of Pistol Shots—
Revellers Turn from Dance
to Pursue Slayer.

New York, June 17.—Villars avenue in The Bronx was alive with the colorful celebration of Padua's patron saint when five shots sounded above the laughing throng early today, and Michael Di Cola, 31 to the sidewalk with five bullet wounds in his chest. He died instantly, too soon to see the quick vengeance of many daggers that flashed in his defense, or to know that Pasquale Tenuerio is a prisoner in Fordham Hospital charged with the shooting.

The celebration of St. Anthony had drawn thousands of Italians to Villars avenue, which was strung with ropes of electric lights and thousands of flags. There were few things nearer the hearts of those who venerate St. Anthony than his public demonstration in his honor. It is an occasion that good Italians never miss, and it was arranged by the Italian societies of The Bronx.

Those who came entertained themselves in their own fashion, and a large group was having its pleasure in a game of "base" held on the sidewalk in front of the candy store at 3181 Villars avenue. Crowds jostled the players on all sides and overflowed into the street. It was growing late, and those who were nearly ready to go home from the open-air celebration.

The excitement they found was not what they expected. Those nearest the shooting were almost crushed with fear, and began to scatter. Others, pressed nearer, and made quick, short jerks with their arms. The blast of electric light flashed back in long steady glints. There was a quiet, then a howl, as one figure broke away from the others and began to run towards the Grand Concourse.

Was Tenuerio, with a mob at his heels. He bore several wounds and was bleeding profusely. Those who followed knew that he could not run far. He didn't, but landed in the arms of Patrolman James McElroy of the Bronx Park station, who had heard the shots. McElroy took him to the police booth at 204th street and the Concourse, and summoned an ambulance which took him to the hospital.

The police say Tenuerio is known as a bully in the Villars avenue neighborhood and admitted that he shot Di Cola.

Calgary, Alta., June 17.—The League of Women Voters of Alberta may soon be formed with its centre in Calgary if plans discussed at a recent meeting of the Women's Political League mature at the annual meeting to be held in September. Notice of motion that the name be changed from the Women's Political League to the League of Women Voters of Alberta was given and will be dealt with in September.

The name is inspired by a similar organization in the United States, the National League of Women Voters, whose members played such an important part in the Pan-American conference, recently held at Baltimore.

It is the desire of the members of the Calgary league to extend the organization throughout the province and an active campaign in this direction will probably be undertaken next fall.

It is understood that a similar movement is being considered in other provinces and the ultimate aim, it is hoped, will be a national league for Canadian women voters. Word has reached here
