New York, June 17—Villa avenue in The Bronx was alive with the colorful celebration of Padua's patron saint when five shots sounded above the laughing Tong early today, and Michael Di Cela II to the sidewalk with five bullet wounds in his chest. He died instantly, too soon to see the quick vengeance of many daggers that flashed in his defence, or to know that Pasquale Tennierio is a prisoner in Fordham Hospital charged with the shooting.




