O'Dowd Wins.

Pocatello, Idaho, July 6.—Mike O'Dowd, the ninth round of his scheduled fight with the champion, was awarded the decision here yesterday when Gordon McKay, who claims the middleweight championship of the northwest, refused to answer the bell at the opening of the 10th round. It was to have been a 15-round affair.

Charlie White Knocked Out.

Benton Harbor, Mich., July 5.—Benny Leonard, lightweight champion of the world, knocked out Charlie White, Chicago, in the ninth round of their scheduled ten round championship fight before a capacity crowd. White carried the fighting to the champion for seven rounds and half knock-outing and pushing the New York champion through the ropes in the fifth round. The Chicagoan who had never been knocked out before, was felled by a series of right and left hooks to the chin finished the challenger.

The men met at catch weights. Leonard scaled 137½ and White 134 at 11 o'clock this morning. Several thousand women were in the crowd.

There was a riot when the fight ended and the spectators scrambled over the seats and into the ring, breaking down the press section and injuring several ringers. None of them, however, were seriously hurt.

Defended Title.

Lawrence, Mass., July 6.—Tommy (Kloby) Corcoran, this city, successfully defended his title to the New England welterweight championship tonight when he won the decision over "Paddy" Flynn, Everett, in a 10-round bout. Flynn was badly beaten but stayed the full time.

Boxer Saves Girl.

Florence Kane, aged nineteen years, of Brooklyn, N. Y., was rescued from drowning the other morning in Martin's Pond, North Reading, by "Paddy" Flynn, pugilist. Flynn was training at the camp of Frankie Callahan, lightweight pugilist. Miss Kane is a sister-in-law of Callahan, who is camping at Reading with his wife and two children. Miss Kane started out on the pond in a canoe, but when about 150 feet offshore her paddle caught under the craft so that it capsized. Flynn witnessed the accident, and jumped into the water. Despite the fact that he was hampered by his heavy trousers and boots, he reached the girl and towed her to shore, where, with a doctor's aid, she was resuscitated.
