How Speaker Got There.

Washington, Feb. 12.—A report telling how Tris Speaker of the Cleveland American League Baseball Club made a train by air route, permitting him to report to Cleveland on time, was received today by Major-General Charles Menoher, director of the Army Air Service.

Speaker received a telegram at his ranch in Hubbard, Texas, recently, to report to the Cleveland Baseball Club at once, but he could not make the train at Waco by any known land route or conveyance. It occurred to him that perhaps his friend, former Lieutenant Pelser of Kelly Field, who lived on a neighboring ranch, might help him out. This Pelser did. They left in Pelser's plane at 11:15 a. m. for Waco and arrived at Richmond in about one hour and a half, permitting Speaker to catch his train at 1:15 for Cleveland.
