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WESTERN BANK FIRST TO ACCEPT THE TERMS OF NEW CURRENCY PLAN

Chicago's Streets of Millions—Secretary McAdoo.

The first bank in Chicago to apply to the Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo in Washington for permission to enter the new federal reserve system and accept the terms in the new currency bill, the National Bank of the Republic, was the first also to urge the clearing house examinations which now are in general favor throughout the country to safeguard the public and the banks and is located at the corner which now is the financial center, Monroe and LaSalle streets, one of the old and the other the new street of finance.

A large part of this bank's business with commercial concerns whose paper will have better recognition under the new act. One of the directors, John V. Farwell, was very active in the currency reform movement, having been president in the National City League for a Federal Reserve Bank.

Others on the board of directors are Louis F. Swift, Joseph M. Cudahy and Charles H. Crane.

One other man, Daniel Hurley, an officer, who had his right arm broken through getting into a door, and who also had his leg badly frozen. He was taken to go to the hospital as the ship's doctor had set the broken limb. So he found accommodations along with the rest of the passengers and crew. Most of the officers and passengers went to the Grand Hotel while others of the new were taken to the Yarmouth Hotel, where they were carefully tended and all their wants supplied. The two officers of the Yarmouth Hospital were Charles, Sisters Baptist and Emmanuel, were met by Dr. J. D. Young, who took them to the Glebe House where they will be entertained while here. The passengers are: J. Adolph, W. Bain, Sister Baptista, Sister Emmanuela, W. Gallant, Miss Hebert (colored) of Nevis; Capt. G. M. Hicks, the master, superintendent of the line; Miss M. James, Miss D. James, C. Kenney, one of the directors; Mrs. H. Lucas, Master C. Lucas, and Mrs. H. Lucas. These all came ashore in the Westport 13. Besides these were brought the chief cook, the second cook, the chief steward, Mr. Porter, and all the waiters, the chief butler, the steward, and second bakers. The names of others who were landed were G. Smith, G. Warren, quartermasters, E. P. Gale, baker, of St. John's, Middlesex, England; James McArthur, officer of Queenstown, T. Tucker, officer of London, England; E. Smith second baker, E. W. Kirby, chief officer, H. Pillerin, F. Douglas, E. Taylor, H. Garons, S. Best, J. Best, Ed. Holder, Abraham, J. Hayne, all firemen of Barbados, England; H. H. Hyde Park, London; Seaman Pettichill of Port Loe, London; G. Phillips, deck-hand of Barbados, D. Jones, fireman, of Barbados, T. Clelland.

Sister Baptista was asked to tell something of her experience but declined and would only say she was thankful to be alive and that some one who was better able to describe the wreck had better talk.

UP TO HIS WAIST
Harry Stanley Wilson, who said he was the chief of the crew, Harry Sparks, a deckhand, both were boys appeared the brightest members of the rescued party. Wilson said he lived in Great Yarmouth, England. He was decked out in a uniform coat and captain's cap. He took delight in repeating what to him was one of the outstanding scenes of herodian namely that the captain yesterday morning had stood in water up to his waist in order to make coffee for them all.

An Italian, pleased from one of the Westport's crew was that when they took the ladies from the first boat one of them was unconscious. All were life belts. She was put in a berth and did not recover consciousness until the steamer was nearly port when she was able to take a cup of coffee.

Saves Ship's Kitten
The thoughtfulness and tenderheartedness of the stewards was manifested in her care in bringing off the ship's kitten which she carefully carried in her arms.
