MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE

Three deliberate attempts have been made this week by a Freiburg to burn the St. Joseph's Academy and Sacred Heart College, in Montreal.

In the appeal of the case of Thos. Nagle v. the St. John & Quebec Construction Co., at Fredericton yesterday, a stay was granted until August sittings. Admirers of Mayor Martin of Montreal have subscribed between \$5,000 and \$10,000 towards a carriage and pair, and portraits of himself and his wife, as testimonials of their esteem.

A nine year old boy, arrested in Montreal as leader of a gang of youthful "bandits," and who has a long criminal record, was sentenced to the reformatory yesterday.

At Fredericton yesterday a portrait of Sir James Carter was unveiled. It was a life size painting of the former Chief Justice, presented by his son, Charles Carter and accepted in behalf of the Barristers' Society by J. D. Phinney, K. C. Speeches in eulogy of the late chief justice were made by several present. The portrait was hung in the supreme court chamber in the parliament building.

At the annual meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association in Montreal yesterday, there was a large attendance. Two thousand dollars was voted to the Empress of Ireland fund. The total membership was reported on as \$,648. Total fire losses for 1913 were \$20,846,618, an increase of five millions in two years. The first social event of the convention was a reception at the Ritz-Carlton hotel last night.

RUSSIAN WOMEN TAKE UP DUTIES OF PRIESTS

Strange Movement Spreads Over Part of Empire

HOLY SYNOD BOTHERED

Sees Difficulty of Checking so Decides on Compromise—Leader of the Campaign Has Been Placed in Prison

Moscow, May 20—Holy Russia has found a new path to hellish through lady priests. Forty odd monkish women, dressed in sheepskins and armed with apostolical staves are tramping her eastern provinces calling on peasant farmers to come and be saved, and warning the numerous ignorant that they will inevitably be lost. Though the chief of these vigorous women now sits in Ekaterinburg jail preaching to unresponsive walls, the cause goes bravely on; and now the Procurator of the Holy Synod, M. Sabler, though he hates modernity, is about to found a women's theological college at Kiev, so that women may fit themselves to preach the true tenets of Mother Russia.

The movement began last summer at Potynoye, near Nazimovsk, a town on the Yenesei River. The priest of Potynoye was drowned during a fishing excursion, and left behind a widowed spouse, Matrona, and an eager widowed church. It was hard to find a successor. Then Widow Matrona came to the rescue and assumed the office. Peasants of several neighboring villages then installed women priests.

The main cause of the spread is the propaganda carried on by the first woman priest in European Russia, Senaviina, a dealer in fruits and vegetables in the town of Perm. Senaviina is a first cousin of the Siberian priestess Matrona, and in that way she got drawn into the movement. This Senaviina, though she barely knows how to write, is no ordinary woman. Senaviina began a soul-saving tour and before last Christmas had induced forty-three peasant women of fairly good education to become priests. Senaviina declares she has a divine vocation. The official church, she says, is ruined by priestly intemperance and by the marriages of priests, and it may be redeemed by women who will take an oath never to touch liquor and not to marry. Women priests who are already married must leave their husbands. Senaviina proved her zeal by leaving her own husband. New and being arrested and lodged in Perm jail on a charge of blasphemy, brawling in church, and incitement to disobedience. Later she was brought to Ekaterinburg; and there she remains. The other women preachers have been left in peace, and they are said to be conducting a vigorous campaign all over the Ural.

St. Petersburg Synod is strongly opposed to this movement, but cannot suppress it. It fears to incur the enmity of the women, who are the best supporters of the church. At a Synod council meeting held last month, M. Matveyeff, a provincial consistory member, declared that in many provinces women are almost the only supporters of the church, at least among the peasants. The peasant men are mostly hostile or indifferent. On the basis of this the Synod decided that the movement for women priests must be treated with caution; and that the vital point is not whether women preach or not, but that if they do preach it shall be in orthodox spirit. So far, the women preachers are nearly all schismatics.

The synod will not allow them to be ordained, but it is willing for them to receive theological education and the present plan is to found in Kiev and some other towns theological courses for women.

IMMIGRATION QUESTION.

The people of the Eastern Townships of Quebec are out after their share of old country immigration. The Eastern Townships Immigration Society has been incorporated under the laws of the province and a permanent office established at Sherbrooke.



PORTRAITS IN ROCKS

Portraits in rocks may suggest to the mind of the reader the sweetest rock sold at the seaside, with caricatures of people in the centre of it, a fashion introduced goodness knows how many years ago, when the song "Said the young Obadiah to the old Obadiah" was in favor. It was called then "Obadiah rock."

But there are marvellous portraits in living rocks, carved by the hand of Nature herself, which, if they are not what Shakespeare calls "sermons in stones," are real resemblances in ruggedness.

The most remarkable of all these natural phenomena is, without doubt, the gigantic statue of Queen Elizabeth, known as the "Queen Bess Rock," at Bedrithan Steps, ten miles the other side of Newquay. It is in the form of an isolated pinnacle standing some 100 feet high, and when seen from one point of view is only a rugged and misshapen mass, but if the right angle is chosen the presentation of the Virgin Queen is absolutely startling. The figure wears the crown, possesses the aquiline nose, the fashionable ruffs of England, and lies the bust, waist, and flowing draperies continue until the base of the rock reaches the really golden sands.

Another very curious natural portrait is what is known as the "Profile Rock," at Boscawen. It is only the head and a portion of the neck. It stands at the mouth of Boscawen Harbor, the most wonderful natural harbor in England, and is of colossal proportions. It bears a striking resemblance in profile to the present Queen, although it is also christened the "Queen Victoria Rock." There is no difficulty in finding it or recognising the portrait, for the writer of this article was not aware of the existence of the rock, was exceedingly surprised on suddenly coming face to face with it.

Near wild Tinagel, on the North Cornish coast, is a great bluff headland standing on the seashore which bears some resemblance to an elephant with its trunk resting upon the sand. It is not so good, however, as the two portraits already mentioned, and it requires getting on a very peculiar position to obtain the exact outline. It is christened the "Elephant Rock," but imagination has been allowed to play a little here.

On the Devonshire coast, at Dawlish, where the sandstone rocks are of a bright red color, some very remarkable portrait rocks are to be found, chief among which is the "Parson and Clerk."

On Dartmoor itself there is the "Bowman's Nose Rock," near Widecombe, which absolutely seems to be laughing at you, and might also have been taken as the model for some humorous drawing by those artists who today make London laugh.
