PROPOSED AMALGAMATION
OF BANKS LOOKED UPON AS
PROFITABLE ARRANGEMENT

Union of Banks of New Brunswick and
Nova Scotia Regarded as Move in
Best Interests of Shareholders and all
Concerned

Although the proposed amalgamation of the Bank of New Brunswick with the Bank of Nova Scotia has to be formally submitted to the shareholders it is generally anticipated that the arrangement will be concurred in by the shareholders of both banks. The directors of the Bank of New Brunswick have given the whole question the most careful thought and they are convinced that the bargain they are proposing to the shareholders is an excellent one and in the best interests of all concerned. It is planned to retain all the employees of the Bank of New Brunswick in the service and to extend the pension privilege to all who are entitled to it. James Manchester, president of the Bank of New Brunswick, said on Saturday that the respective boards of the banks had agreed upon terms to be submitted to the shareholders of both banks. The proposed agreement is being mailed to the shareholders. It is printed elsewhere in this issue of The Times. The shareholders are to receive share for share and an additional sum of \$100,000, being \$10 per share, is also to be distributed pro rata.

NANTEL MAY FOLLOW

Bourassa in Ottawa Advising Nationalists—Parliament on November 21

Ottawa, Oct. 20.—A special issue of the Canada Gazette will be issued tomorrow formally summoning parliament for Nov. 21.

Hon. Bourassa, the chief Nationalist, arrived in the capital today and had a long conference with Hon. F. D. Monk. The latter's resignation from the government will probably be officially announced on Tuesday next, after Premier Borden has communicated with the Duke of Connaught, who returns to the capital tomorrow.

The announcement of Mr. Monk's resignation in the cabinet is not expected for a few days, pending the result of the present efforts of Premier Borden to decide both as to this new colleague and to where it will be safe to open a seat for him.

Hon. Bruno Nantel is still wavering as to whether or not he will follow Mr. Monk's lead and resign. The embarrassment in which he has been placed by Mr. Monk's consistency in adhering to pre-election pledges is dawning with increasing brightness on the minister of inland revenue, and he is now more inclined to resign than to stick and brave the inevitable attack of both Nationalists and opposition when parliament meets. Mr. Nantel, where he will attend the wedding of his daughter next Tuesday, and where he will take advice of his constituents.

These are the main new developments of the political situation here during the past twenty-four hours.

Premier Borden is still struggling with the difficulty of mending the split in his cabinet, caused by Mr. Monk's retirement, and he is seeking the solution of the problem, having in view also the probable retirement of Mr. Nantel. The problem before him is how to fill two cabinet vacancies in Quebec with men of proven ability. The opening of two seats in a province where there is practically no ministerial talent is open since the ministerial candidate is likely to be opposed by a Nationalist, and by a Liberal candidate.

Borden Cabinet Hunting Again.

There was no cabinet meeting yesterday and the premier spent the day advising with several of his ministers and with Montreal supporters as to who should be the new minister or ministers, and as to how to provide the necessary seat or seats in the commons.

As far as can be learned no definite decision has been reached, but indications
