KEEL OF ENGLAND'S MIGHTIEST IS LAID

Work Begins on the 28th Dreadnought of the Fleet of Great Britain

First of Five Provided in the Naval Programme of Present Year—Will Be Largest Battleship Ever Built in England

Portsmouth, Eng., Jan. 15.—The keel plate of Great Britain's twenty-eighth ship of the dreadnought class, was laid today in Portsmouth dockyards.

The keel of the first of the five armored ships provided for in the British naval programme of 1911-12, will be completed in the course of the year 1914, and when she has been added to the navy, Great Britain will possess thirty-two dreadnoughts or super-dreadnoughts, half of which will be armored with 12 1/2 inch guns.

The vessel laid down today has not as yet been named. She will be the largest battleship ever constructed in England, displacing between 20,000 and 25,000 tons.

A number of improvements have been introduced by the constructors in the arrangements of the internal subdivisions, intended to maintain the danger of torpedo attack, while the anti-torpedo battery will consist of sixteen six inch guns, whereas her predecessors have been armed with only four such guns for the purpose of encountering torpedo boats.

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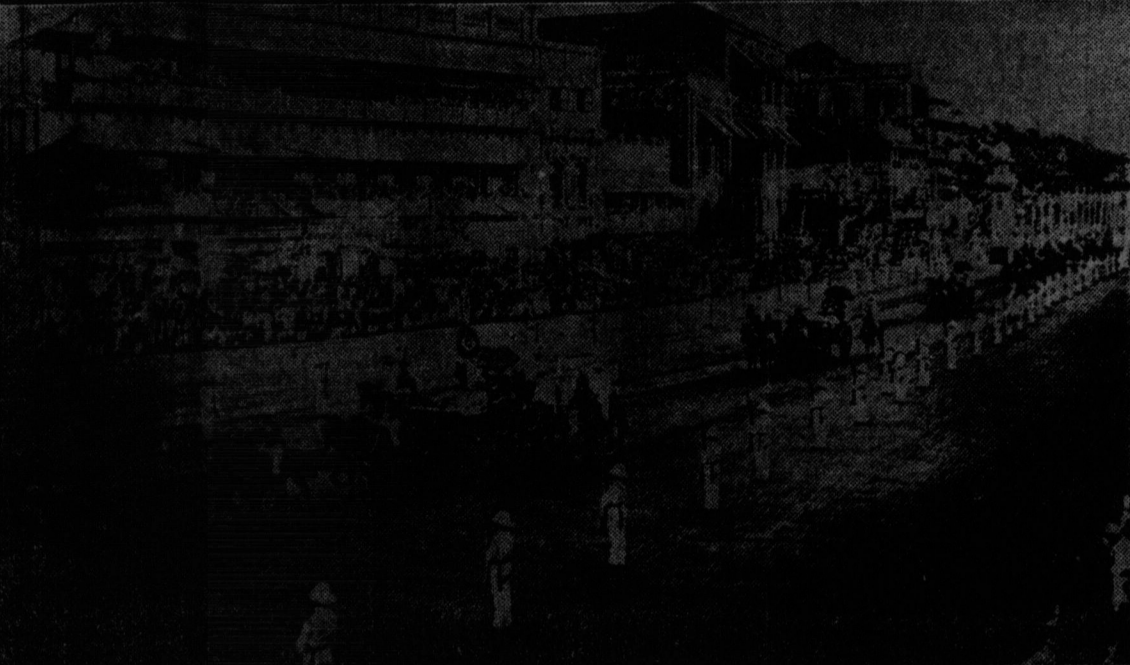

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FOUR BURN TO DEATH IN BOSTON

Two Women and Two Children Victims in Attic Bedroom

Many Killed in Wreck

Trains Crash in Pennsylvania—Fearful Death of Man at the Sea—Two Navies Killed by Dynamite—Florida Man Shoots Father-in-Law, is Killed

Boston, Jan. 15.—Four women and two children were killed when a lamp exploded in their attic bedroom in a three-story building on Commercial street, Boston, Saturday night.

The victims, who were suffocated before they could be rescued, were Mrs. Catherine Conners, aged fifty years, an invalid and a widow; her daughter, Mrs. Mary Logan, aged twenty-five years, a widow; and the two children of the latter, John, aged two and a half years, and Julia, aged eighteen months.

Quebec, Jan. 15.—Two Bulgarians met with a terrible death on the line of the Quebec & Saguenay railway, now under construction. They were engaged in shoring out dynamite, when the explosive went off and they were terribly mutilated.

Newcastle, Pa., Jan. 15.—A Baltimore & Chicago passenger train crashed into a Pittsburgh & Lake Erie train in the railroad yards here today and five persons are reported killed.

So. Ont., Jan. 15.—A terrible death struck Thomas Belanger, who was also plant yesterday afternoon. While crossing the bridge of the Algonquin Central Railroad, Belanger caught his foot in a frog and before it could be released eight cars piled over his body. Belanger held on to his car, but was crushed.

Windsor, Man., Jan. 15.—A. G. Boyce, whose father was named in Port Worth on Saturday by J. B. Stodd, with whose wife young Boyce had eloped, arrived in Winnipeg last night.

Moncton, N. B., Jan. 15.—(Special)—The home of Sylvain M. LeBlanc, an employe in the C. N. R. shops, with all his furniture was destroyed by fire today. He lived in White Settlement, Lower Country. Mrs. LeBlanc and children had a narrow escape from death. The loss is about \$100.

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HOME RULE OPPONENTS ARE ACTIVE

Unionists in Ulster Try to Create Sentiment in England

Bill Likely in March

London, Jan. 15.—The home rule campaign is growing in Ireland, particularly in Ulster, where a vigorous campaign is in progress in the hope of creating sentiment in England against the proposed bill of the day.

It is reported that the bill will be introduced in the house of commons in March, but the plans of the Unionists are expected in April when Andrew Bonar Law, the Unionist leader in the house of commons, will make an address at a cabinet rally in Belfast.

The demonstration in Omagh the other day included a parade in which the Unionists were present in numbers of 20,000 to 30,000 men. That is commensurate with the liberal newspapers, which make the assertion that there were less than 5,000 in the procession.

The Unionists are making the most of the Pope's decree forbidding Catholics, under pain of excommunication, from being seceders into Ulster. Their contention is that an Irish parliament would be overwhelmingly Catholic, and that it would therefore be dominated by the Pope, as constituted by Archbishop Walsh in communication to the newspapers. The Irish anti-Catholic newspapers call on the Unionists to say definitely whether the decree applies to Ireland, about which some doubt is expressed.
