## FITZGERALD AND HARRINGTON FOR PROVIDENCE CLUB

Two of Fredericton Players Step up — The Team Averages in Local League

(Fredericton Gleaner.)

When Capt. Bob Ganley of Fredericton's 1912 championship ball team left for his home in Lowell, Mass., last evening he carried with him a commission from President Frank J. Navin of the Detroit American League club to sign up Catcher Do-do Fitzgerald and Pitcher Harrington for the season of 1913.

Mr. Navin is the owner of the Providence Club of the International League and the two players referred to are wanted for the Greys, now managed by "Wild Bill" Donovan, formerly prominent as a pitcher for the Detroit club. Both players had previously agreed with Ganley to sign with Mr. Navin and they are expected to attach their signatures to the contracts the first of next week in Boston.

The Montreal club of the International League had claimed they had Fitzgerald, but the promising young catcher is now going to join the Greys instead of the Royals. Frank Harrington was Fredericton's leading pitcher in the N. B. & Maine League this year and the Providence club are now to have the star battery of the league. Harrington's home is in Wakefield, Mass., the home of Pat Duggan, who has been playing well ball.

In his third game with the Providence club "P. J." didn't make a hit, but contributed a sacrifice hit and accepted all five chances he had in centerfield. The game was played at Jersey City and went twelve innings to a tied score 4 to 4. The Gleaner presents the team batting averages in the N. B. & Maine League during the last season. The figures show that Fredericton had by far the strongest batting club in the league and the hitting ability of the team had led to do with keeping them on top of the heap throughout the season.

Boston, Sept. 13.—Eddie Murphy, the local lightweight, declared that, because of the knockout he sustained recently at the hands of Jack Britton of Chicago, he intends to quit the game altogether. Murphy says he is going to spend what money he has on some horses and go into the training contracting business, where his brothers have made plenty of money.

Welsh Goes Home.

Freddie Welsh, the English lightweight, sailed for home last week from New York after failing for a second time to win the world title with McFarland in the Garden on September 27. Welsh was ready to concede 135 pounds at 3 o'clock to clinch the match, but it appears that McFarland held out for each weight. If Welsh had agreed to those terms, he argued, he would have been at a big disadvantage inasmuch as he would have entered the ring weighing not more than 133, while Packey probably would have carried at least 138 or perhaps 140 pounds.

Welsh did not care to run such a risk in view of the fact that he is matched to box Matt Wells, the British lightweight, under the terms of the contract. Welsh is in the city, the guest of her brother, J. H. Harris. S. E. McKee left this afternoon for Salisbury and will join a hunting party in the Canadian woods. Mrs. McKee also went to Salisbury, where she will visit for the next two weeks, she will also visit St. John and Sussex before returning home.

## TO UTILIZE THE SUN AS A SOURCE OF ENERGY

'New York, Sept. 16.—The possibility of using the energy of the sun as a substitute for the failing coal supply was the subject of an address by Professor Giacomo Ciamician of Bologna, Italy, at the concluding session of one of the sessions of the International Chemistry Congress here. The speaker said that since the earth's supply of coal is limited it is not soon to be expected that the possibilities of getting power from other sources.

He outlined a plan of putting the sun's rays to work by a chemical process after the manner of plants. In conclusion he said:

"If we should become able to utilize the energy of the sun in the way I have described the tropical countries would be the most conquered by civilization, which would in this manner return to its birthplace."

On the arid lands there will spring up industrial colonies without smoke and without smoke stacks. Forests of glass tubes will arise everywhere; inside those tubes will take place the photo chemical secret of the plants, but that will have been mastered by human industry, which will know how to make them bear even more abundant fruit than nature; for nature is not in a hurry."

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## FATHER O'DONOVAN WELCOMED HOME

Parishioners Gather at Reception in Honor of Beloved Priest—He Speaks of Ireland

After a three months' trip to Ireland, Rev. J. J. O'Donovan, enjoying the best of health, returned to his parish in Carleton Place on Saturday and was given an enthusiastic welcome by his people, who assembled in large numbers to greet him.

He said he had taken much delight in his trip to the land of his birth, where he spent most of his time while abroad. He visited the principal cities of the Emerald Isle, and many historic spots, such as Killybegs, the River Shannon and other places famed in drama and prose.

Father O'Donovan said that conditions in the old country were encouraging. It was most pleasing to see the eagerness of the people to give their children as much education as possible, and there was little possibility of Ireland losing her title of "The Land of Saints and Scholars." The crops this year, he said, were good but the trouble was in finding men to labor in the fields. Conditions in general he thought were greatly improved.

While away Father O'Donovan paid a visit to France and was at the famous shrine in Lourdes, where two miracles were performed. One young man recovered the use of an arm, while a little girl who had been completely blind had her sight granted. An pilgrimage had been made to the shrine on August 15, and was declared by physicians to be completely cured.

Father O'Donovan was met at the Fairville depot on the arrival of the Boston train at noon on Saturday by a committee and taken to his residence in a motor car. In the evening at eight o'clock his parishioners, together with the Sunday school children, gathered at the priest's residence and extended a formal welcome.

An address was read by Timothy Donovan, after which Father O'Donovan made a fitting reply and expressed his appreciation and thanks for the welcome.

The children sang patriotic songs and the City Corrus Band rendered selections.
