**ATTENDANCE AT PLAYGROUNDS IN JULY WAS GOOD**

**Official Closing Will Be On Aug. 19—Reports to Association**

The average daily attendance on the city supervised playgrounds during the month of July was 1,078, it was reported at the regular meeting of the Playgrounds Association meeting held yesterday afternoon in the Health Centre, when plans were made for field days for the older girls and for the older boys of the playgrounds and for the official closing of the grounds on Aug. 19. It was decided to have a playgrounds booth at the Saint John exhibition and a special committee was appointed to see that the booth was suitable. Frank T. Lewis, president, was in the chair at the meeting and in the absence of L. M. Farquhar, the secretary, his duties were filled by J. H. Marr.

Miss E. Heffer, supervisor, in her report of the work of the playgrounds, told of the regular visits of the play leaders, Miss G. Wilson and Miss E. McFadden, to all of the grounds and of baseball games, hikes and swimming arranged for under the direction of the male instructors. The usual craft work in sewing, crocheting, knitting and embroidery was being done by the children of from six to nine years.

**EAST END GROUNDS**  
At the East End grounds the daily average attendance was 238; at the Carleton grounds it was 285; at Centennial, 217; at the Allison grounds, 177; at Alexandra grounds, 109; at King George grounds, 102. There were a total of 80 visitors at all of the grounds. Sanford Goldman, male instructor on the Centennial grounds, has been compelled to resign because of his health and this was much regretted as he had given splendid service. Ray McMurray was appointed his successor in the work.

For the Allison Park grounds the supervisor, Mr. Hayes, reported that there were one or two adult games played there on every fine night and Junior games as well as practices for the Y. M. C. A. and Scouts meets.

A field day for the older girls of the playgrounds was arranged for Tuesday of next week and a field day for the older boys was planned for Thursday of next week. These field days will be conducted under the supervision of the playgrounds taken to the Allison Park grounds. It will be necessary to have the small children from the further grounds taken to the Allison Park grounds by street car and Mr. Marr was appointed to make necessary arrangements. If Aug. 19 is rainy the closing will be held the following day.

When it was decided to have a booth at the Saint John exhibition, Miss Heffer asked that necessary expenditure and assistance be arranged for in order that the booth might be made a worthy one and this was agreed to. The committee appointed to act in this matter was composed of Miss E. Heffer, J. H. Hamilton, Mrs. M. H. B. Good and Mrs. A. C. D. Wilson.

**ANOTHER CARLETON COUNTY CHILD HURT SEVERELY BY FIRE**

**Lighted Match is Thrown on Clothes of Girl, 9, at Greenville**

**FLORENCEVILLE, N. B.**  
Aug. 6.—Another child of Carleton county, dangerously hurt in an accident on Thursday, is now being cared for in the Fisher Memorial Hospital at Woodstock. It was reported here tonight.

She is Evelyn Lunn, 9-year-old daughter of Lee Lunn of Greenville, four miles from Florenceville. Her younger sister had thrown a lighted match which fell on Evelyn's dress and in less than a second her clothing was all in flames. The terrified child rushed out of the house to her father, who was close by and he quickly crushed out the flames, but not before the child had been burnt deeply all over her body. She was rushed at once to the Fisher Memorial Hospital and reports from the hospital tonight were that her condition was quite serious. There are several other children in the family.

At the Woodstock hospital it was said tonight that the condition of Gerald and Percy Lovely, aged four and six who received severe burns on the abdomen of the lower part, at River Bank, near here last night, when one Vernon Lovely, was fatally burned, was still critical. Lorne, the eldest, who was also burned, will probably recover.

The children's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Fred Lovely. A lamp exploded in the room of the children setting fire to the bed. The parents extracted the children from the flames with great difficulty.

Mr. Lovely is a brother-in-law of Edwin Melville, M. L. A., of Carleton County.

**MEIGHEN DEFENDS ACTION IN FORMING DOMINION CABINET**

**Says Government Quit and He Was Asked to Step Into Office**

**NEW LISKEARD, Aug. 6.**—“Only to finish the business of the session was this done,” said Premier Meighen here last night, describing the events which led to his formation of a government.

“His Excellency asked me to form a government,” Mr. Meighen said, “and I am supposed to have committed a terrible offence against the constitution by agreeing to do so. I wonder what else I was to do. The government resigned. I did not resign. They dropped out. I was leader of His Majesty's opposition and not only so, but of the strongest party in the House of Commons.

“Does anyone say that it was not my duty to form that government? I was not asked to make any prophecy as to how long it would last and I made none. My duty was to form it. My duty was to carry out the balance of that session, to make law such things as parliament had passed, to give effect after that to such policies as I could get a mandate from the people of Canada to give effect to.

“Some tell you that I should have refused. The meaning of refusal would have been that Mr. King would again have been sent for to reform his government, knowing that just as soon as the commons could get a chance they would vote to censure that government.”

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**TRAVEL BANNED IN 5 MORE COUNTIES**

**Northern Two-thirds of New Brunswick Shut to Fishermen**

**FREDERICTON, Aug. 6.**—The forest fires menace continued so serious in New Brunswick this evening that the provincial department of lands and mines added five counties to the list in which forest travel is banned, thus shutting off the northern two-thirds of the province to fishermen, campers and others until this situation is relieved.
