MAKE BREATHING EASY.

PECULIAR POLITICAL SITUATION IN BRITAIN.

(Continued from page 1.) London, Nov. 18.—Herbert H. Asquith, former premier, in delivering an address at Westminster tonight, said that the whole future international development of the world was in the crucible of a blunder and a calamity that the country should be plunged into the tumult of a general election. He said his case against holding an election was greatly strengthened by the fact that the men most entitled to express an opinion on the reconstruction of affairs—the soldiers in the field—would be unable to vote. The house of commons which will be brought into existence, he said, will be of a nature as to lack the right authority. He said that he was prepared to give fullest support to any government which grappled with the problems of reconstruction on progressive lines, but he added: "When the lion and the lamb lie down together, it sometimes is found that the lion has not lost its taste for live mutton."

Agreed on Peace Aims. Mr. Asquith contended that the country was as much agreed on peace aims as it had previously been in accord on war aims, and that the international council chamber would act with the indisputable mandate of a united people. Moreover, he said, there was no vital divergence about needful transitional measures at home necessitating immediate elections.

Referring particularly to the restraint in criticism and in debate which has prevailed, Mr. Asquith said: "We must get back as soon as possible to the old atmosphere of freedom. There is no government and no parliament but will benefit thereby. I advise the Liberals to take a straightforward course, to keep their eyes open and their hands clean."

Mr. Asquith declared that the value of free trade had been proved by the war, because it had enabled Great Britain to bear virtually the whole heavy burden of the alliance.

Referring to numerous points of policy advocated by Premier Lloyd George, which people can fully support, he deprecated in the strongest language conflicts between members of the Liberal party.

Compulsory Service Must End. He said he would refuse to countenance opposition to any Liberal candidate who had been true to his pledges to the party. He said that the abnormal conditions under which the country has been living for the last four years must be ended. He referred not merely to restrictions on personal liberty and freedom of speech, but said even compulsory military service must be ended.

First Section Leaves. Copenhagen, Nov. 19.—The first section of the German fleet to be delivered to the Allies left Kiel on Sunday for the North Sea.

This section of the fleet comprised the battleships Bayern, Grosser Kurfurst, Kromprinz Wilhelm, Markgraf, Koening Albert and Kaiserin, and the battle cruisers Seydlitz and Moltke.

U-Boats Will Come. London, Nov. 19.—Considering the surrender of German ships to the Allies a German wireless message received here says that a meeting of U-boats crews at Wilhelmshaven on Nov. 18, it was resolved to take the submarines out whenever the necessary orders were received.

ANTI-JEWISH OUTBREAK. Stockholm, Nov. 19.—Anti-Jewish outbreaks, with numerous fatalities to Jews have occurred in several towns in the western part of Polish Galicia, according to the Jewish press bureau here.

FRENCH TROOPS ON THEIR MARCH TO THE RHINE

Welcomed Everywhere by the Inhabitants—Pitiable Condition of Former Prisoners—Hungarian Abandoned Much Material

Paris, Nov. 18.—Progress by French troops advancing to occupy territory west of the Rhine is traced in the official statement issued at the war office today. The text of the statement follows:

"Our troops continued their march this morning and are being received with growing enthusiasm by the people of the occupied regions. The enemy has abandoned enormous quantities of material, locomotives, railroad cars, automobiles and magazines of all sorts. Thousands of French, Russian, English and Italian prisoners are entering our lines from German prisons. Their condition is indescribable."

"In Belgium we have passed the railroad running between Beaurain and Florenville. Further east we have reached the line of Hoffange, Bertrix and Strainmont. Our troops are also in the Janoigne region south of Neuf Chateau."

"In Lorraine we have occupied St. Marthe-the-Chateau, the south bank of the Nied river, and are on the road toward St. Amand. We are in the region of the heights of the Saar. Our troops have made solemn entrance into Saarburg, Dieuse and Mohrangen."

"In Alsace we have crossed Col Saevange and have installed our advance guards at the gates of Wasselheim and Moelsheim. Further south we are in the proximity of the Rhine from north of Neu Breisch as far as the Swiss frontier."

"The people of the occupied regions do not cease to give our troops touching evidences of their love for France."

London, Nov. 18.—The programme for the surrender of the German fleet, as the result of conferences held between British and German naval authorities, is that the ships will leave German ports on Wednesday and will be taken over by the Allies on Thursday. King George and the Prince of Wales will review the German fleet at Rosyth on Wednesday. Later the fleet will sail for the rendezvous assigned for the surrender ceremony.

PRICE OF ANTHRACITE GOES UP \$1.05 PER TON

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—Inquiry at the office of the fuel controller as to new prices for anthracite coal elicited the following information:—

The price charged for anthracite coal in Canada is based upon the prices in the United States and these are fixed by the United States fuel administration. In an official despatch from Washington an increase of \$1.05 per ton is authorized on domestic sizes, the revision being made to meet increased labor costs. Emphasis is, however, placed on the fact that the new price schedule is effective only on coal mined on or after November 1.

COMMONS CONGRATULATE KING ON ARMISTICE AND ON HIS PART IN WAR

London, Nov. 18.—The House of Commons today passed a motion, moved by Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, in the absence of Premier Lloyd George, who is suffering from a slight cold, congratulating King George on the conclusion of the armistice and the prospects for a victorious peace, and for his unselfish devotion to the task in which the nation is engaged.

"Where phantom kings are falling," said Mr. Bonar Law, "our sovereigns are passing, without escort, through the streets and meeting with tributes of respect, devotion and affection."

Herbert H. Asquith, the opposition leader in the House of Commons, seconded the motion of Mr. Bonar Law.

STEAMER ABANDONED AT SEA HAD LANDED PASSENGERS AT HALIFAX

Boston, Nov. 18.—The steamer Caspasia, which has been abandoned in a storm off Cape Race, sailed from this city for St. John, Nfld., November 9, with passengers and a large cargo. She touched at Halifax where some of the cargo and all but one of the passengers are believed to have been landed and resumed her voyage to St. John on Friday, after being detained a day by bad weather. The steamer had only recently been put in service by the Nova Scotia Steamships, Limited.

BAN LIFTED ON IMPORT OF U. S. DRIED FRUIT

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—The Canada Food Board announced that the United States food administration has notified the country that all restrictions on the export of dried fruits into Canada, with the exception of peaches, apples and prunes, have been released. Canadian importers, however, still require an import permit from the Canada Food Board.

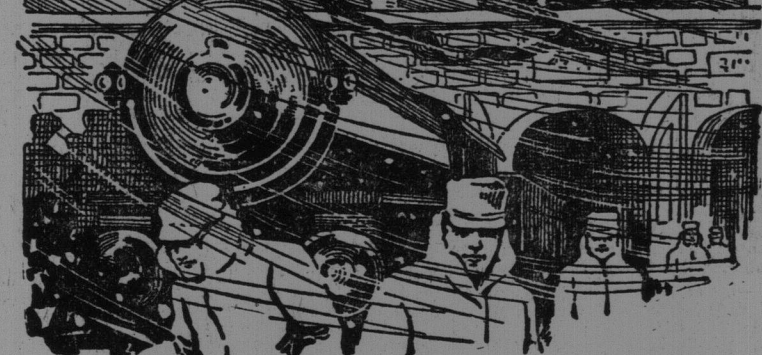
