rive at 9.00 p. m., instead of 9.30 p. m.

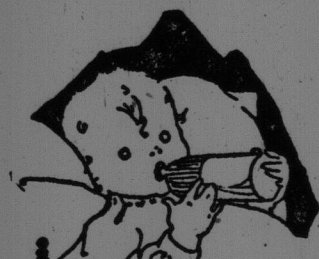
No. 183 suburban from Hampton will

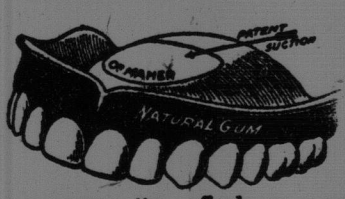

Tranby. Tranby was pocketed to the
stretch by Dewey and beaten in the
first heat. He got out and won in the
second and third, but the Portland mare
took the next two. Hastings, of Boston,
was called to the stand and said that he
had to do all his driving on the stretch
and was doing the best he could. In the
224 pace Bradford, owner and driver of
Peter Florentine, was taken off after
being warned, and Bill Flemming put
up but failed to better his position. Eva
Frico of W. A. Newbert's Boston stable,
took the 214 stake in straight heats from
a fast and fighting field. Violet Patch,
an old Maine campaigner, went to a
new win race mark of 2:12 1/2 in the 212
pace. Earl Jr., 2:01 1/2, a famous grand
circuit performer, now trained to trot
drillless, made what is claimed a
world's record of 2:17 on Tuesday and
did the mile a second slower yesterday.

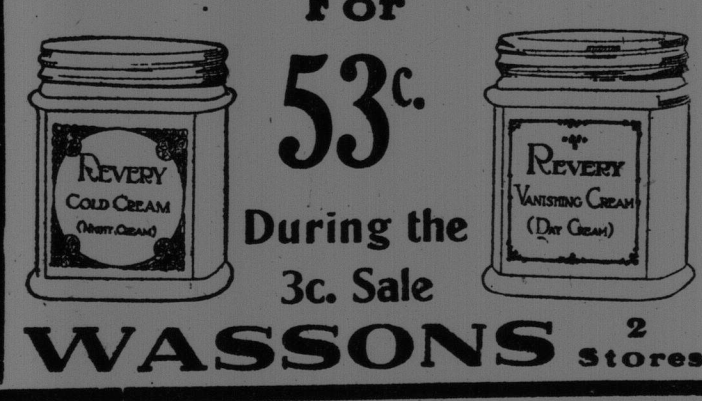
