

A dispatch from Helena, Mont., says: While excavating in Brondway for a waterworks connection, workmen uncov-ered a chunk of rich copper and gold cre weighing fully 75 pounds. The rock was broken in two and was found to be thoroughly impregnated with copper While it has not yet been as sayed, old miners declare it very rich in both copper and gold.
