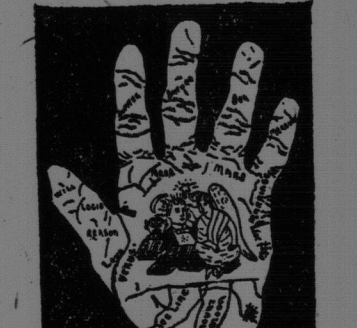

CONFERENCE AT VIENNA ON DUELLING

"The conscience of Austria has been stirred against the duel. A conference is now sitting in Vienna charged with devising some means by which outraged honor may be soothed and set to rights without murderous assault," says the Freeman's Journal. If the Congress at Vienna carries its peaceful point, Austria will lead the way in Continental Europe towards a decency that to many seems a dream.

"Italy, Spain, Russia, Greece are all given to the duel. In Germany, though the despised civilian is not allowed to fight, the officer the Army or Navy must, if he be challenged or if he be insulted. The University student is still proud of his duelling pastimes, and if he did not carry on his face the marks of his boyish bravery he would get a poor welcome into any society and have a very hard time in the camaraderie of his profession.

"It is hard for us to understand how men can meet solemnly to discuss such a thing as the duel. Surely it is not a thing which has come to seem so so criminal. If it be serious, as to be a matter for police and prisons. When

two men wearing broadcloth are angry with each other in Paris they go out in great state with guns and doctors to the Big-Whale or to a private park; friends are summoned to see the contest; there are motor-cars in long lines outside the field. When one of the combatants is touched, blood drawn, he goes to bed, the others to lunch.

FOR GENTLEMEN ONLY: "When two men that wear blouses quarrel—or even two that wear broadcloth, provided they do not possess gold watches, or 'keep a gig,' or are not in the great circle of the Tour-Pan—their, if they adjourn to fight out their differences with knives or revolvers, or even fists are apaches, disturbers of public peace, brothers, public nuisances, the scum of the danger of Paris; they belong to the mob, and they are giving an opportunity of civilizing themselves in jail.

There never yet has been admitted by any French police any physical contest among members of 'The Lower Order'—that is, not a duel; it has never been admitted as a duel. In duelling countries you have to be a gentleman; it is not allowed to take avenging shots at your enemy. And many men use the duel as a means of confirming a gentility that is felt to be doubtful; many journalists are known to have made all their social career by way of the bloodshedding or the silly pretence of bloodshedding of the field of honor. CLOTHED BY LAW. "Summary" laws—that is, laws about clothes—have been unknown in England for many years. The first of the reign of Henry VII. It was enacted that a duke should not be allowed to wear more than sixteen yards of cloth to make a suit, while a knight had to be content with six, and commoners with an even less amount, irrespective of individual bulk.

In 1584 another law forbade all below the rank of alderman to wear silk upon their hats, under a penalty of \$50. Charles IX. of France was even bolder. He forbade with the title of the women of his realm. In 1581 he forbade the ladies to use any "bands of embroidery, stitching, or finings of silk, excepting only a bordering the width of a finger, or at the most, two borders with chain stitching."

But the French king of three and a half centuries ago was, after all, not so rash as the Roumanian Minister of Public Instruction, who recently issued an order forbidding the use of corsets by any of the girls attending the Roumanian Government schools. The head mistress there were made responsible for the carrying out of the rule, but the result has not been all that the minister fondly hoped. The girls have set the edict at defiance, and they are, it is said, secretly backed up by most of their teachers.

In most countries there are laws forbidding women to go abroad in the streets attired in men's garments. But fortunately, few modern men are so easily shocked as the Governor of the American territory of Oklahoma.

LONG SKIRTS BARRED. At Enns, and one or two other German health resorts, the municipal authorities have been waging war against long skirts and dresses with trains.

PARIS, July 24.—By a lucky chance the police have discovered the individual who stole a number of statues, including one of Iris, from the Louvre Museum.

A detective, quite accidentally, overheard a dispute between a man and woman in which the latter threatened to denounce her companion as the author of the robberies in question. The officer followed the man to his home in the Rue Cadet, and a few inquiries established the fact that he was a habitual criminal of the name of Julian Cruan. He was arrested, and readily admitted his connection with the theft. He denounced as his accomplices a cousin named Emile Cruan and a Belgian named Leon Vavaasseur.

The first expedition he informed the examining magistrate, took place in October, 1906. At 3 o'clock one afternoon, dressed in long overcoats with capes, they entered one of the galleries in the Louvre looking on the river.

Vavaasseur and Emile Cruan advanced towards the monumental chimney-piece while he himself kept a lookout. After a little while the two came back and all three left. The booty, which was a statuette of Iris, was taken to a barber's shop in the Rue de la Glaciere. Emboldened by their easy success they returned a few days later to the Louvre and took another statuette from the next gallery, under the very nose of the attendant, who was dozing in an armchair.

The day after Vavaasseur tried to break open a case containing antique jewelry, but the skeleton key used broke in the lock.

By this time the thefts had been discovered, and a hue and cry raised, so Vavaasseur took the stolen objects from the shop, saying he was going to bury them in the woods at Clamart.

Warrants were issued and Emile Cruan was soon arrested. As for Vavaasseur, all efforts proved useless until he was discovered accidentally in custody on a charge of stealing bags of mutton at the Central Market.

The statuettes which Emile Cruan had been packed up and deposited with an old clothes dealer had not been traced.
