MR. TARTE WILL RESIST. The premier of Prince Edward Island has announced that a conference of maritime province ministers will be held to secure a change in the act of confederation.

On the last question the Montreal Board of Trade is in record against anything slower than twenty-three knots. Strong opposition has been raised in that city against the inclusion of a freight service in the contract, especially if the contract is made with a railway company.

But the promoters are not likely to have plain sailing. Mr. Tarte's Patrie is out in contemptuous opposition to the movement, finding it an attempt to reduce the importance of Quebec, and the influence of French-speaking Canadians.

La Patrie begins by saying that it is especially remarkable that Mr. Tarte's attitude is not now. Prince Edward Island is the smallest of the provinces, says Mr. Tarte's paper, "but the most frantic in its lamentations."

Proceeding to the point, La Patrie states the case as set forth by Premier Peters, and refers to the suggestion that if the representation is further reduced "the cry of secession will be raised."

Beneficiaries Applaud. The second reply to the Sun's reflections on the Tweedie-Pugsley government comes from the Fredericton Herald, whose average receipts from the government are \$5,000 a year, and whose editor receives \$350 a year as one of the four engraving clerks of the assembly.
