MOSQUITOES AIDED IN

DOWNFALL OF GREECE

Spartan Courage and Athenian

Patriotism powerless against

the Pest from Egypt--An

English Scientist's Opinion.

When in the twilight of autumn

days some mosquito buzzes about

your head and you strike at it vi-

oluntarily with open palm, have you ever

paused to think what ruin and death

that tiny insect on gauzy wings has

wrought in the world's history?

Bearing germs of fever and sickness

across land and sea, the mosquito is

now charged with depopulating cities,

devastating countries, and even wip-

ing out a whole civilization.

"What!" you will say. "This tiny

insect that I will kill between my

fingers responsible for the overthrow

of a civilization?" Even so, accord-

ing to the Chicago Inter Ocean.

Listen to what Sir James Crichton

Browne, an eminent English scientist,

says in his recent book, "Parasitomy

in Nutrition."

"Wars drained Greece and moral

laxity enfeebled her, but it was, it

now seems clear, the insignificant

mosquito that compassed her ruin.

Mr. W. H. S. Jones and Mr. G. G.

Ellett have shown that it is in the

highest degree probable that the de-

terioration of the Greeks in the four-

teenth century before Christ, their aban-

donment of belief in religion, a future

life and the value of patriotism, was

brought about by the introduction of

spreading among them of malaria by

the diffusion of which the configura-

tion of the country affords special fa-

cilities.

The mosquito was introduced into

Greece, we are told, by ships sailing

from Egypt. Since the insect was as

numerous as Sahara sands in Nilotic

marshes from the times when the

Sphinx was young, the mosquito's

## COUNTY COURT

IS IN SESSION

AT HAMPTON

Several Cases Before His

Honor Judge Wedderburn--

Judgment Deferred in Case

of Forbes & Jonah vs. Culbert

WILL OF J. D. FOWLER

IS PROBATED

Hampton, N. B., Oct. 21.—In the

adjourned session of the Kings county

court today, the following cases were

before Judge Wedderburn:

Forbes & Jonah vs. W. B. Culbert,

an action to recover a balance of \$40

due for fees for attendance as at-

torneys in certain Scott Act cases

against the defendant and others in

his employ, W. D. Turner plain-

tiff, J. H. McFadden for defendants.

The witnesses for the plaintiffs were

W. N. Biggar, J. P., before whom the

cases were tried, and Justice David Little. He produced the

records of the court and was followed

by G. W. Fowler and W. B. Jonah,

the latter proved his claim as reason-

able charges and was cross-examined

by Mr. McFadden.

Denied Charges.

The defendant on the stand denied

that he had employed Mr. Jonah to

defend Chapman and Mallory, the oth-

ers charged with violating the law,

tried at the same time as his own case

and claimed that he had settled his

own case with Mr. Jonah for fifteen

dollars and a half, which was less than

the original claim. On rebuttal Jonah

swore that there had been no settle-

ment but the amount named had been

received on account, also that the

three cases were substantially Cul-

bert's who had personally engaged him

to defend them. He also denied the

truth of many of the statements

of defendant. McFadden moved

for a non-suit, on the grounds that

an attorney cannot maintain an action

against a client, and that there was no

corroborative evidence to support the

plaintiff's claim. He cited cases in

proving his argument. Mr. Turner

replied with counter cases and argu-

ment on both counts. His Honor tentat-

ively refused the non-suit, with per-

mission to argue the points at issue

at chambers before judgment is given.

war—bloody war—for fun, money or

poorly paid, but highly hungry bat-

talions of Gens. Chamorro and Juan

Estrada, rebel leaders, are ready to

clash.

Since this latest of the numerous

Wars that enliven the dull life of the

country, it is not surprising that
