## NEW ROUTE FROM QUEBEC TO ST. JOHN

(Bangor Commercial.)  
Augusta, Me., April 15.—Northern Maine will be the scene of more railroad construction during the present year than will take place in any other part of New England. It is well understood that the Bangor and Aroostook is taking steps looking toward the beginning of the construction of the so-called Allagash extension this year, and A. R. Gould, of the Aroostook Valley is authority for the statement that that road will build 100 miles of new line this summer, unless something occurs to interfere with the present programme.  
The new Aroostook valley route from Quebec to St. John is only 375 miles in length as compared with 578 miles via the Intercolonial line, which swings up around the Maine border, but stays entirely on a Canadian soil.  
Mr. Gould is a firm believer in the electrification of transportation lines in Maine.

## REPUBLICANS OPPOSE TO RECIPROCITY

Washington, April 17.—Representative Fordney of Michigan, a Republican member of the ways and means committee, today in the House attacked the Canadian reciprocity bill. "President Taft," he said, "will be the candidate for the Republican party for re-election, and I will vote for him gladly, but I differ with him radically on this Canadian tariff question."  
Mr. Fordney said he had lost all the money he had put into the four milling business at the time of the Wilson tariff bill and that he had been "diced" in the wool protectionist ever since.

Washington, D. C., April 17.—"After a thorough canvass of the Republican membership of the House, I can state positively that a substantial majority of the party will vote against the Canadian reciprocity bill," said Representative Dwight, of New York, the Republican whip, tonight. The bill is to be put on its passage this week.

This will not prevent its passage, even though a number of the Democrats follow the course now indicated, and vote against the majority of their party. The Democratic majority in favor of it has greatly increased in the new congress, however.

Five speakers participated in the debate today. Representative Fordney of Michigan, a Republican member of the ways and means committee, and Representative Lenroot, of Wisconsin, an insurgent Republican, spoke at

home and abroad. "Do you endorse your party's action in passing the Payne tariff bill?" asked Mr. Cullop, of Indiana. "I do," said Mr. Lenroot. "Do you regret it a violation of your party's pledge?" "I do," said Mr. Lenroot. "If my party had kept its pledges there would have been a minority upon your side of the house instead of a majority," added Mr. Lenroot.
