PROPERTY SALES IN THE COURTNEY BAY REGION

Ten Lots at Courtney Bay Heights Sold to Cement Company—Other Property Sales Reported Yesterday.

G. W. Badgley, who has been in the city for the past few days, and who left for Montreal last evening, reports a sale of some interest. The big Cement Company, consisting of several Albert county men and some others with whom Senator Donville is interested, has purchased ten lots of land in Courtney Bay Heights. This deal was put through yesterday and it is understood that the Cement Company will erect business offices on the property which runs from the Red Head Road, and is quite near the location of the proposed dry dock. Alfred Burley & Co. on Saturday sold to W. E. Rupp a freehold property situated on Chesley street. It is stated that the sale was made on most advantageous terms. The Davidson building on Prince William street, owned by H. J. Garson, has been sold for \$15,000 to Mrs. H. Peters. It is understood that the Semi-Ready Company, of Montreal, has taken over the Dunlop-Cooke Company's lease of their King street property and has purchased the store buildings. They will open a branch store here.

BURIED YESTERDAY.
