After Dr. Cox of the big tuberculosis hospital at Matapan, Mass., had expressed the opinion that the site on Merritt street, selected for the St. John County (Tuberculosis) Hospital was very well suited to the purpose...

Dr. Cox said that if the institution was properly conducted there would be practically no danger of contagion. The whole object of the institution was to train the patients so as to dispose of their spittle in the most proper way.

Asked by Com. Schofield as to the effect of such institutions upon real estate values in the neighborhood, Dr. Cox said he had no definite knowledge, but at Matapan had been built up much more rapidly in the last four years than in the ten years before the hospital was established.
