An active demand for fish—Advance in price for Potatoes packed in bags.

Havana circular of May 26.—"Better enquiry has been in evidence during the week for fish in and, although prices only experienced a light advance, indications point to an upward tendency. We quote fish at 7 3/4, haddock at 6 3/4, hake at 5 cents per pound. An active demand still prevails for fish in cases and as a consequence stocks have been reduced. Together with the fact that the advance during the last few weeks makes the situation look strong of course, price has made a gain. Norwegian codfish is quoted at \$11 per case, the being exhausted of other species. With a fair demand ruling, herring are being affected at \$11 large box. During this week demand for potatoes has not fallen and while the price for potatoes in barrels declined, bass and we quote at \$2 5/8 per barrel 1.35 per pound, for bags.
