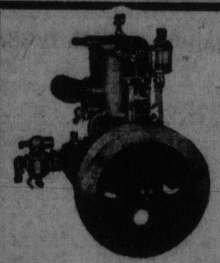

OBITUARY.

Luther Jordan

A prominent leader in the lumbering and milling industry passed away yesterday when Luther Jordan died at his home, 90 Main street, at 1.10 o'clock in the afternoon, death being attributed to angina pectoris. Many friends in St. John and many in Upper Canada and the neighboring republic will learn with surprise and deep regret of the sad event.

Mr. Jordan, who would have been seventy years of age had he survived until next month, was in comparatively good health until yesterday. He was able to be about as usual on Monday. He leaves, besides his wife, Mrs. Ellen Jordan, two sons, two brothers, two sisters and one grandchild.

The children are Messrs. Frank and Pearl Jordan of this city; the sisters, Mrs. Eva Jordan and Mrs. Charles Buzell of Oldtown, Maine, and the brothers, Moses and Harvey, also of Oldtown.

The late Mr. Jordan was a native of Maribou, Maine, and was engaged in lumbering and milling throughout his business career. He was part owner in the Jordan mill at Pleasant Point. He was a member of the Masonic order and of the Odd Fellows.

The deceased was an attendant at the Main street Baptist church.

The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock.

Miss Samantha Eaton

The death took place yesterday morning at her home, No. 37 Melville street, of Miss Samantha Eaton. The deceased was a daughter of the late Aaron Eaton, a successful merchant and shipbuilder. She was for many years active in Centenary church and took great interest in all questions affecting the welfare of the community. Robinson Resigns Leaving
Opposition Party Leaderless
and More or Less at Sea

Guardianship of "The Lost Cause" confided to keeping of W. E. Foster, of St. John, Dr. E. A. Smith, of Shediac and Committee — Convention adopts Government's policy on Temperance Question — New Organization formed to jack up old machine.

When the stalwarts of His Majesty's Loyal Provincial Opposition folded their tents just as the shades of evening were falling, yesterday, they dispersed and went forth to wander as sheep without a shepherd, as scattered survivors of a once strong and influential party—a party that is now leaderless. Hon. Clifford W. Robinson, who announced his resignation to the convention, formally tendered his resignation yesterday and the convention was obliged to accept it.

No successor was selected, but a committee, headed by W. E. Foster, of St. John, chairman of the executive, was chosen to guide the waning destinies of the party until a new Moses can be located. As the situation now stands Mr. Foster heads the list, while Dr. E. A. Smith of Shediac practically continues as head of the opposition. Monday night's session, formally tendered his resignation yesterday and the convention was obliged to accept it.

The convention adopted the government's policy respecting the temperance question by agreeing to advance legislation in favor of prohibition, should it get the opportunity. The platform also favored taking crown lands and roads out of politics, purity in elections, the completion of the Valley railway from Grand Falls to St. John, and election of members of the legislature by districts instead of by counties at large.

Soon after the convention reassembled the troublesome temperance question came up. Mr. Foster, quoting from The Standard, explained his position regarding an invitation sent to the Dominion Alliance to send representatives to the convention. He averred that The Standard had said in big head lines that the Alliance did not approach the opposition and conveyed the impression that he had misrepresented the Alliance. Mr. Foster said he had called him up on Monday saying that the president of the Alliance, Donald Fraser, had telephoned him to arrange for a delegation to appear before the convention. Mr. Foster said he consulted other members of the executive and then communicated with Mr. Stockford, telling him that the delegation would be welcomed.

Soon after Mr. Foster had made his statement, and while Rev. Veniot was moving the prohibition resolution, a delegation consisting of Rev. C. Fleming, Rev. W. B. Robinson, J. W. L. Smith, E. N. Stockford and E. S. H. McFarlane arrived and were welcomed by the convention. Mr. Foster then repeated his statement. Mr. Stockford said that Rev. Thomas Marshall had telephoned him from Fredericton saying that somebody had asked that a delegation visit the convention and asking him to make the arrangements.

Standard Was Correct.

The statement made by The Standard was confirmed by a communication from Rev. C. Fleming, secretary of the Alliance, addressed to the convention, in which that officer stated: "The PRESIDENT OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK BRANCH OF THE DOMINION ALLIANCE RECEIVED AN INVITATION TO BE PRESENT AT YOUR CONVENTION AND STATE THE VIEWS OF THAT BODY. OWING TO THE PRESSURE OF OTHER MATTERS HE IS UNABLE TO BE PRESENT WITH YOU AND HAS ASKED HIS EXECUTIVE TO APPOINT A REPRESENTATIVE IN HIS STEAD."

The remainder of the communication which was read to the convention follows:

"I am here to thank you for the courtesies extended to our body and to state to you that in compliance with the request of the Alliance as per copy of memorial appended, a reply from the Premier was received by our president Mr. Donald Fraser, to the effect that 'It was decided that at the approaching session of the House of Assembly, legislation providing for prohibition will be enacted.'"

"The request was as follows: '1. The New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Alliance, representing the various temperance interests of the province, respectfully asks the government of New Brunswick to enact a law prohibiting the liquor traffic for the whole province.'"

"2. The Alliance begs to state that a committee of the Alliance is prepared to meet with the government to draft a satisfactory bill, and respectfully asks for that privilege."

"3. The Alliance requests that the bill so prepared be submitted to the people of the province in the form of a referendum not earlier than the middle of February, and not later than the first of March."

"4. The Alliance asks, further, that providing a majority of all the votes cast is in favor of the Prohibition Bill submitted, the government will at once during the then session of the House secure its enactment."

"(Sgd.) DONALD FRASER, JR., President. (Sgd.) C. FLEMINGTON, Secy."

Following Mr. Fleming's statement, Michael Kelly, Mr. Bentley, Mr. Currie and Mr. Veniot declared that the executive of the opposition had the prohibition resolution under consideration before the representation of the Alliance had appeared before the convention, and that therefore were not forestalled by the government in regard to the question.

The prohibition resolution was carried by a rising vote. The Alliance delegates then withdrew.

New Association.

In the afternoon, on motion of Mr. Foster it was resolved to form a Provincial Opposition Association. Dr. Smith, of Shediac, was elected chairman.

McFarlane, Kings; Mr. McCor-Simbury, Geo. P. Burdett, York; Reginald Dibble, Carleton; Geo. Taylor, Victoria.

Dr. Smith, chairman of the new organization, is president of the Westmorland County Liberal Association, and is a former mayor of Shediac. He is fifty years of age, the son of a late Edward J. Smith, at one time a member of the provincial legislature, and is a nephew of Hon. Alexander McKenzie's cabinet. Dr. Smith is a graduate of the dental school of the University of Pennsylvania and practiced dentistry for a time in Shediac. He abandoned his profession to take charge of the extensive lumber and mercantile business founded by his father. He has long been active in Westmorland county politics.

Veniot on Corruption

Mr. Veniot of Gloucester introduced the following resolution, which was adopted: "Inasmuch as the corruption in public life seems to have its origin in the deplorable practice of corruption at the polls, therefore be it resolved that this convention place itself on record as in favor of a strict enforcement of the laws against corruption at the polls."

On motion of Nelson W. Brown of York, seconded by Mr. Veniot, the following resolve was adopted by unanimous vote: "Resolved that the convention of the opposition of New Brunswick in meeting assembled place on record their unfailing devotion to His Majesty the King in this dire extremity of the Empire, and be it further resolved that we strain our resources to the utmost in men and money to assure a crushing defeat of our enemies, a decisive victory and abiding peace."

Robinson's Resignation

F. M. Tweedie on behalf of the committee appointed to arrange the question of leadership reported that Hon. Mr. Robinson's business interests made it impossible for him to continue and they recommended that the leadership be entrusted to a committee consisting of W. E. Foster, L. A. Dugal, M. L. A. Wm. Currie, Peter J. Hughes, Dr. E. A. Smith, E. S. Carter and P. J. Veniot. Mr. Foster was made chairman of the committee.

A. M. Rowan moved, seconded by A. T. Legere that the thanks of the opposition party be tendered to E. S. Carter, P. J. Veniot, L. A. Dugal, M. L. A. F. B. Carvell, M. P. and P. J. Hughes for the splendid work they had accomplished. This was carried by a standing vote. After the chair presentation of the vote of thanks Messrs. Carter, Veniot, Dugal and Carvell responded briefly.

A finance committee of which Dr. J. E. Hetherington is chairman and Peter J. Hughes of Fredericton treasurer was appointed. A few minutes later the suggestion that the expenses

of the convention be paid on the spot met with response.

The Platform.

The platform adopted is as follows: (1). We pledge ourselves completely to re-organize the crown lands department so that its administration shall be entirely severed from politics and administered on sound business principles, under systematic plans by a non-partisan commission specially appointed for that purpose, responsible to the legislature and working in co-operation with the Dominion Commission of Conservation.

(2). We pledge ourselves to take the highways out of politics, giving the expenditure of the money collected from the people and the control of labor together with the government appropriations into the hands of supervisors, chosen by the people of each parish, to whom a detailed and audited account must be rendered every year at an annual meeting, and a duplicate thereof forwarded to the Department of Public Works, the work of the supervisors to be under the inspection of a competent provincial engineer. We also pledge ourselves to set aside the money collected from the licenses upon automobiles and other motor vehicles, together with an equal appropriation from the revenue of the province each year, to pay the interest upon the bonds to provide for permanent roads, which shall be constructed as rapidly as possible.

(3). We pledge ourselves at the first session of the legislature to pass a law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors within the province to the fullest extent allowed by the constitution, and within three months after the passage of said act to submit the same by referendum to the electors of the province, and, should the majority of votes cast be in favor of the said law, then to bring the same into force by proclamation within one year thereafter.

(4). To amend the election laws so as to make it impossible for members of the legislature to traffic with the government and still retain their seats.

To make it possible for young men when they reach the age of 21 to register their names and be placed forthwith upon the voters' lists instead of waiting for the tedious machinery of revision as it now exists.

To divide the counties into electoral districts which shall each be represented by one member.

We will also consider an amendment to the election laws to make bribery in municipal as well as in provincial elections impossible.

(5). To obtain at once a correct statement of the financial condition of the province in order that the people may have definite knowledge of the vastly increased public debt and the enormous obligations of guarantee bonds which will be laid upon them to pay, and to reduce the cost of the administration of affairs and the number of useless offices as to avoid the necessity for direct taxation now confronting us.

(6). To give the farmers all the practical assistance that the resources of the province will permit to improve agricultural methods and quality and quantity of the stock upon the farm; to reduce the enormous salary list in the department and to spend the educational grant received from the federal government without regard for political patronage.

(7). We pledge ourselves to complete the Valley Railway from a point on the Transcontinental Railway at or near Grand Falls to St. John, and in lieu upon the Dominion government carrying out the terms of the original agreement and allow the province 40 per cent. of the gross earnings thereof.

(8). To always maintain and improve the educational service of the province and to co-operate with the federal government in carrying out the recommendations of the commission upon technical education.

(9). The inauguration of a vigorous immigration policy: to properly place before intending immigrants whose number will be large after the termination of the war, the advantages and the agricultural possibilities of New Brunswick.

The convention finally adjourned at 5.30, most of the out of town delegates leaving the city on the evening trains.
