INSPECTOR VINCENT EXONERATED.
Commissioner Tweedie's Report on Investigation of Charges
Against County Liquor Inspector--The Selling by Drug-
gists' Method--Mary Morris Case Not Reported.

Hon. L. J. Tweedie has submitted his report to the lieutenant governor and council of his investigation into charges and complaints made against County In-
spector George R. Vincent, in connection
with the liquor in the parishes of St. Martins
and Lancaster. The report is here given
in full. His Honor the Honorable A. R. Mc-
Clellan, Lieutenant Governor of the
Province of New Brunswick, and Council.
May it please your honor,—Having been
appointed by commission issued under the
great seal of the province of New Brun-
swick on the 20th day of July last to hold
an investigation into certain charges and
complaints made against George R. Vin-
cent, Inspector for the county of St. John,
under the Liquor License Act of 1890, I
have the honor to report to you, as follows:
On the 21st day of August, at which time
said investigation was adjourned till
Tuesday, the 21st August instant, and
continued till Wednesday, the 22nd Aug-
ust instant, when the same was conclud-
ed. Six days were occupied in taking the
evidence and hearing the addresses of
counsel and that in all 25 witnesses were
examined.
That, in brief, the charges against the
said inspector were:
1st—That he had acted in defiance of
law and that no steps had been taken
by the inspector to prevent such sale or
to follow out the law and that if he had
acted properly steps the law might be en-
forced, but he had not done so and that
representations of these facts had been
made by the people of the parish of St.
Martins to the lieutenant governor, the
commissioners of their petition in any
way directed to the non-enforcement of
the law. This, I think, should have been
done in fairness to Mr. Vincent by the
commissioners of their petition to the lieut-
enant governor and the lieutenant gov-
ernor for his dismissal. The commis-
sioners gave evidence on the investigation
and expressed themselves satisfied with
the administration of the law. It is not
the duty of his office, and they seem to
have no knowledge that complaints were
made or that there was any cause for
the non-enforcement of the law in the
county.
In regard to the parish of Lancaster—
as far as I could gather from the evi-
dence, the only complaint was made by
the applicants, and it was not their desire
nor the desire of the people generally
in that locality to have her prosecuted.
I think the inspector in this case
acted in a proper manner, and in cases of
this nature, I think it is the duty of
the inspectors to have her prosecuted, and
in my opinion, were not just, and the
inspector gave very satisfactory ex-
planations of all transactions inquired in-
to.
I submit the evidence herewith and
have the honor to remain,
