Dainty Sandwiches

No one ever wants to make or serve a sandwich that is not dainty but too often the bread breaks because it is too fresh, or the sliees are filled too full of the mixtures and the result is far from what was intended.

Bread for sandwiches should be at least twenty-four hours old; butter each silce lighty before cutting it from the loat. Now trim off two sides of the crust. These trimmings may be browned in the oven and kept for breading or used other ways so this is not wasteful. In making lettuce sandwiches roll the leaves up and cut them across with schasors. A whole lettuce leaf is difficult to handle and spoils the appearance of the sandwich.

When chicken is used you can add one-third veal without anyone being the wiser so far as to the taste. To do this cook the veal with the chicken and let it cool in the chicken front. Chop both together and season with celery salt and white pepper.

A new mixture that is very pungent is to chop crisp fried bacon into bits and cover a sandwich slice with it and on this place a fine, boned sardine, split open and spread out flat. Spread with mayonnaise or with mustard. Cover with a thin upper slice.

Dutch sandwiches are made from Bohemian or rye bread. Chopped, chipped bed, cheese, hologas sausage and finally chopped pickle are all used. Salami is a fanely seasoned sausage, that may be bought from any German butcher, that is delicious with rye bread.

A hearty filling that will please everyone and that no one will be able to identify is made by frying country sausage and dried salted beef together until well done. Drain and put through the chopper and mix with mayonnaise dressing.

A fashionable filling is made with caviar. No one ever is fond of this flussian delicacy but sandwiches made from it are often passed. Fut a small sized box of the caviar into a shallow bowl and best into it alternately a little lemon juice and olive oil until you have a thick white passe. Press a hard holied egg through a sieve and sprinkle this over the eaviar after it is spread on the brea

When boiling new potatoes, place them in boiling water to which a little salt and milk have been added. This preparents them from turning black.

If the legs of the table or chairs are aneven, tack a piece of cork to the short leg. The tacks will sink into the cork and not scratch the floor.
