Health and happiness in the outdoor life

In front of a shop in Amiens, France, there is a sign "English spoken here. American and Canadian understood."

On the farm of Henry Swain, near Eagle, 1,863 boxes of strawberries were picked in one day from one acre by eleven pickers.

From 90 degrees in the shade on Thursday to a flurry of snow on Friday morning was a Northern Ontario experience last week.

L. I. Hunt, a former well-known business man of Alvinston, died last week at the Mayo hospital in Rochester, Minn., following an operation.

The death occurred in Stratford of Mrs. Thomas Benstead, in her 60th year. Mrs. Benstead was taken suddenly ill and died in a few hours.

J. D. Kennedy, a former manager of the West Lorne branch of the Merchants Bank, has been appointed superintendent of branches for Alberta.

According to the report of Henry Conn, public school inspector for West Lambton, the attendance has decreased 355 in five years and 782 in ten years.

The Bothwell Oil Co., Limited, has taken over the holdings of the Fairbanks interests in the Bothwell field, consisting of about 600 acres and some 100 wells.

A Detroit man was killed by the bursting of his auto tire. He over-inflated it and the explosion threw him with great force against a brick wall, fracturing his skull.

Lake Erie is from two to three feet above normal level this year. As a result summer cottagers at Erieau have had to move their buildings farther inland, and former sidewalks and improvements have been washed away.

Timothy Carroll, aged 19, who burned the house of his employer, Patrick Lamphier, Biddulph, causing a loss of \$4,800, was sentenced to an indeterminate period of from three months to two years in the reformatory. He said he burned the barns because he did not want to do the chores.

A farewell party was also given at Crinan. Mr. Haig has been pastor of the churches at West Lorne and Crinan for ten years.

The coming refrigerator is one that will keep the food chambers cold without the use of ice. It is already on the American market, but will not be likely to reach Canada for a season or two. It has coils and pipes and re-torts, and cools as an artificial freezer does, by evaporation produced by chemicals. These chemicals cost less than natural ice, and are far less trouble.

The wattle fly, which is supposed to have been brought here by eastern cattle, is beginning to cause trouble among cattle in this county. The fly lays an egg in the skin of the animal. This hatches out and causes a lump to form the size of a walnut. The grub grows and eats its way around under the skin, unless squeezed out by hand, or the lump is rubbed with axle grease which closes the tiny aperture in the skin of the animal through which the insect gets air, and it dies. If not gone after vigorously, it will cause much trouble.

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JUNE 28 MOMENTOUS DATE

The world's greatest war was formally brought to an end at almost the identical hour on which occurred the deed used as an excuse to start that war five years before.

The peace treaty was signed at 3 o'clock, Paris time, June 28, 1919.

At almost that same hour of June 28, 1914, Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir apparent to the Austrian throne, and his morganatic wife, Countess Sophie Chotek, were assassinated at Sarajevo, capital of Bosnia-Herzegovina, by a Serbian resident of Bosnia.

July 28, 1914, one month after the death of Francis Ferdinand, Austria declared war on Serbia, marking the beginning of hostilities.

August 1 Germany declared war on Russia and invaded Luxembourg. Germany sent her ultimatum to Belgium on August 2 and declared war on France on August 3. The next day Great Britain declared war on Germany.

June 28 also is the anniversary of the renewal of the triple alliance with Germany, Austria and Italy, which has been broken by the war.

June 28, 1890, the German Reichstag adopted a bill creating a new German army, the organization which is greatly diminished in power by the treaty.
