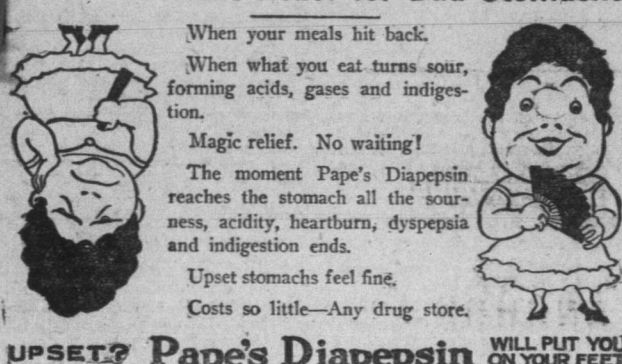

Lt.-Col. J.L. Youngs Ordered Overseas
Alderman Stevenson Stratford received a telephone message at noon today from his Warship Lt.-Col. J.L. Youngs in London, stating that he had been ordered overseas. He had just received word a few minutes before and did not have any particulars as to how long he would be away, nor did he know for certain when he was going. Further word is expected from him. Should it prove that he would be away for a short time, Mayo Youngs could be granted leave of absence. He is Commander of the 1st Depot Battalion W.O.R., London, and was elected Mayor at the recent civic election by a large majority.

Asks for recount.
J. Wesley Kent Woodstock through his solicitor, made a deposit with the Clerk of the Court asking for a recount of the ballots in the recent Woodstock Mayoralty contest, by which A.J. Gahagan was elected in a three-cornered fight by a majority of 23 over W.D. Hobson and 62 over Clifford Kent. In the affidavit Mr. Kent gives it as his belief that a number of ballots at different polling divisions were wrongly rejected and that an other polling division the statement given out by the returning officer was not correct.

A Dog Case.
The dog tax was a question before the Police Court this morning. After it had been disposed of three dollars were handed over to the Township by Edward Moser.

Tax Collector Clemens in the performance of his duties to collect the taxes found it necessary to have the defendant, who had not paid the tax, state his case before the Magistrate. The defendant's explanation was that he had two dogs last February 27th, when the Assessor of Waterloo Township made his rounds. He was taxed \$2 for one and \$4 for the other.

Between May and July he sold the animal on which there was a \$4 levy to a resident in this city, who last year paid a city tax on the dog. About April the other dog died. So he felt that he should not pay any tax.

Magistrate Weir reviewing the circumstances said that \$3 was a fair compromise and that he should pay this to the Township collector. The defendant could not understand why he should. "Now see here, there is no reason why you shouldn't pay taxes for the half year namely, the first six months of 1918, which are not paid. Three dollars is a fair adjustment. You better pay it to Mr. Clemens," Magistrate Weir said, pointing out that the city taxes run from July 1st, 1918 to July 1st, 1919, and the Township from Jan. 1st, 1918 to Dec. 31st, 1918. "All right, I'll pay it but I don't see that it is fair. It's not right, I shouldn't pay anything," the defendant said, as he put his hand in his pocket and pulled out two bills. "It's a fair adjustment you are altogether too saucy. You should pay \$6.00. What's the use of arguing. I'm inclined to have you pay the costs," the Magistrate remarked.

"Well, I'll pay it but I want a receipt," Mr. Moser remarked. The Magistrate replied, Mr. Clemens accordingly signed a small piece of paper and handed it to Mr. Moser, remarking: "You know we don't like to do these things but sometimes we have to do them if we are to do our duty."

A Sign of Growth.
The continued growth of the city is reflected in the crossing number of pupils at the schools. For example at King Edward School eighteen new pupils have entered since the beginning of the new year.

Man families are moving into the city, the heads of the same securing employment with the city and street. They come from Owen Sound, Harrow, Lestow, New Hamburg and many other places. At King Edward School the influx is marked owing to the proximity of the Dominion Iron factory and the new houses built in the neighborhood.

All schools however are well attended and are filled.

Hamilton Board of Trade.
The annual meeting of the Hamilton Board of Trade was held when the President A.C. Garden, assumed office. E.P. Coleman Chairman of the Improvement Committee urged that special attention be given to the town planning scheme. It was decided to hold a membership campaign, and raise the fee from \$10 to \$25 a year. Larger quarters the appointment of a publicity commissioner and increases of salary for the Secretary and his staff were recommended. The Markets committee urged the creation of a large shelter on the Central Market. The receipts for the year was \$4,717 and there was a small surplus Russell T. Kelley, the retiring President urged every member to do all in his power to help the returning soldiers. He thought the city could raise \$120,000 to buy land for small farms to be given to the soldiers.

GOING TO JAPAN
