

Brantford Youths Acquitted.

Honorable acquittals were given by Magistrate Livingston of Brantford to Robert Moreau and George Atkins in connection with the arson cases in this city. The only evidence against Moreau, who was charged with sending threatening letters to Fire Chief Lewis, in which threats were made to burn other buildings was the testimony of A. E. Day and J. S. Rowe that the handwriting of Moreau shown by letters written after his arrest was similar to that in the letter produced in court. The Magistrate held this to flimsy evidence, and gave an honorable discharge. In the case of George Atkins charged with arson, there was not evidence offered by the Crown and he was also honorably acquitted. It is noteworthy that since the incarceration of these men the alarm bells have not sounded.

The Central Fire Department was called out three times last night between 7 and 8 o'clock, every alarm being a false one. The fire bug is apparently still at large.
