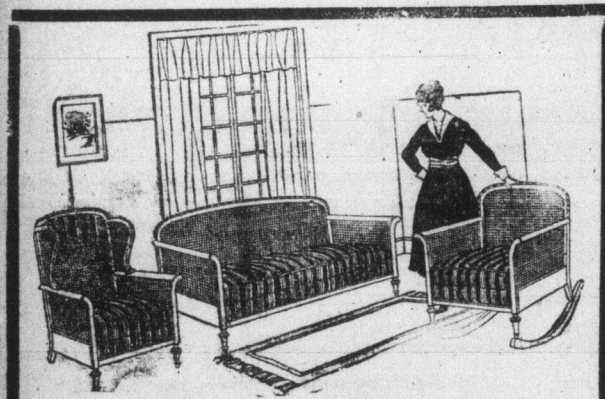

## GIANT DIRIGIBLE BEEN LOST AT SEA

Had Flown 1300 Miles to  
St. Johns

WAS ENTERED BY U.S. NAVY St. John's P.M. May 15.—Plans of the United States navy for a trans-Atlantic flight by dirigible received a serious jolt this afternoon when the giant "Blimp" C-5 burst from her moorings in a gale and was swept out to sea soon after she had arrived from Montauk Point after being in the air continuously for 25 hours and 5 minutes.

Lieutenant Charles G. Little of Newburyport, Mass., who was given charge of the C-5 after her crew had been taken off was almost carried away by the fugitive gas box while making a nerve attempt to deflate it. When she broke away he seized the rip cord and gave a tug which should have opened up the big envelope and permitted the gas to escape. The cord broke however, and Lieutenant Little realizing he would be unable to bring the ship down, leaped out from a height of 25 feet. His only injury was a sprained ankle.

The escape of the C-5 followed a long struggle by sailors from the cruiser Chicago to prevent its injury when gusty west winds swept across its moorings place in Quidi Vidé basin and began tossing it about.

Several of the sailors clinging to guy ropes were thrown down by the dirigible's ginal tug, but none were injured.

The loss of the Blimp was a bitter disappointment to Lieutenant-Commander Emory W. Coil and his crew of five. Despite a heavy fog and unfavorable weather they had brought the big ship over a 1,300-mile course from Montauk Point with a performance record which they were confident would have brought the coveted order for the Navy Department to attempt the overseas flight.

Commander Coil said the C-5 had performed perfectly on the trip from Montauk Point and only final authorization from Washington, a routine inspection of the engines, and replenishment of fuel and supplies the aviators had believed stood between them and the trans-Atlantic flight. Although the C-5 performed "perfectly" the weather "did not perform nearly so well" one of the crew said. "It was the roughest ride I've ever had" he declared "but this was due to the bumpy condition of the atmosphere not to the ship.

At the time he continued, the winds carried the big ship until its engine stood on end and stopped, but as soon as the ship righted itself the motors went to work again.

In the airship breakaway three accidents occurred. Lieut. Little sprained his ankle jumping from the dirigible. A boy named O'Donnell, aged 15 had his right leg broken by a rope parting and a boy Kavanagh about the same age sustained injuries to his brain from the same cause, from which he is likely to die.

## Holland May Refuse To Give Up Kaiser

OPINIONS GENERAL THAT  
HIS SURRENDER WILL  
BE REFUSED

The Hague May 15.—The question of the surrender of the former Kaiser has not yet been laid before it, and as yet has been brought only before the German Government.

The only statement so far forthcoming was that recently when it was officially declared that the Government would act according to law and her treaties.

With the exception of the Amsterdam Telegraaf no other Dutch newspaper is pleading for extradition. The Nieuwe Courant expects that the Government will refuse, as the delict committee by the ex-Kaiser is not mentioned among the delicts for which the treaties make extradition obligatory and possible.

Although the findings of the commission of well-known international lawyers appointed to consider the question has not yet been made public there is every reason to believe that they do not differ from the advice which most of the Dutch lawyers voiced in their organ Weekblad voor de Recht, which says, "If the politicians want to condemn the Emperor they should take them the responsibility and should not shield a political deed by the mask of a lawsuit."

DENIKINE FRUSTRATES PLAN TO BISECT THE RUSSIAN ARMY

London May 15.—General Denikine commander of the anti-Bolshevik force has frustrated by a counter-offensive the Bolshevik plan to bisect his army by capturing Rostov-on-the-Don, at the head of the Sea of Azov. The War Office makes this announcement to-night. The Bolshevik have been compelled to move their positions to the northward.

BOX LUNCH IS CONVENIENT

The workers in Kitchener factories do not now need to bother carrying lunches with them but can give their order at the factory office in the morning and at noon a tasty and substantial lunch is ready for them. The Unicefs Box Lunch is the name of the enterprising concern which has inaugurated this movement, the manager and proprietor being Mr. L. Rosen, a returned soldier. Mr. Rosen, in speaking to the Record this morning expressed his thanks to the manufacturers for their cooperation, without which it would have been impossible to make a success of the new business. The scheme as worked out by Mr. Rosen has proven very successful, and factories where his directions have been followed have been more than pleased with the new lunch system. All lunches are served in sanitary paper boxes, while the cost is very low.

## New Franchise Act Causing Interest

DISCUSSION MAY OPEN IN  
HOUSE BEFORE BILL  
IS INTRODUCED

OTTAWA, May 15.—Discussion of the question of the future policy with respect to the Federal Franchise may be precipitated in the House of Commons before the introduction of the Franchise bill which the Government intends to bring before Parliament at the present session. Members of the Opposition have been asking of late when the promised legislation would be presented. They are now threatening to move on the motion to go into supply a resolution calling for the repeal of the War Time Elections Act unless the Government introduces its own early edict. The Government has been bringing steadily and has, moreover, succeeded in passing a number of important measures. Furthermore, such a resolution would not necessarily lead to a discussion of the subject of the franchise on its merits since it might be regarded as a vote of want of confidence in the Government and might be treated as such. The new legislation which is to be introduced will, of course, supersede the War Time Elections Act. The question is to what extent it will perpetuate provisions of that Act.

## AMERICAN CASUALTIES TOT- ALLED OVER 286,000

Washington, May 15.—Revised figures made public to-day by the War Department showed that the total casualties of the American Expeditionary Forces during the war was 286,044. Battle deaths numbered 48,900, and the total of wounded was placed at 237,135, with the explanation that this represented a duplication of about 7,000 by reason of the fact that many men were wounded more than once.

## JURY IS NOW COMPLETE IN \$1,000,000 LIBEL SUIT

Mount Clemens, Mich., May 15.—The jury to try the \$1,000,000 libel suit of Henry Ford against the Chicago Daily Tribune was completed this afternoon. The opening statement for Mr. Ford will be made tomorrow morning by Mr. Murphy and Weymouth Kirkland, of counsel for the Tribune, said to-night that he would follow with an outline of the contentions of the Tribune.

## FINALLY DROPPED INTO SEA 85 MILES OFF THE SHORE

St. John's Nfld., May 15.—The United States navy dirigible C-5 which escaped from its moorings here this afternoon dropped into the sea about 85 miles off shore, according to a radio message received to-night by the cruiser Chicago from an unidentified British steamship.
