Provincial Parliament.

The House has been in session four weeks and there remains much to be done. The Opposition have done everything to expedite business, but the Government appears very slow in bringing down their legislation. The 'good roads' bill has not come to hand yet. It is said the Cabinet are very much divided on the subject. Evidently much hard feeling exists between the Attorney-General and the Commissioner of Works and Mines. Today the former moved the second reading of a bill affecting trust companies. Mr. Armstrong and Mr. Wickwire took exception to it, and on a vote being taken the Attorney-General's bill got the three month's hoist. Mr. Daniels' only supporter being Mr. Faulkner. The latter is President of the Maritime Trust Corporation, while the Attorney-General is President of the Nova Scotia Trust Company. The Premier is on the Directorate of the Eastern Trust Company. In other words the Government is simply a big Trust Company. When Sir Robert Borden became Premier of Canada, he resigned as Director of several Trust Companies. Sir Thomas White did the same, but not so the members of the Nova Scotia Government.

Several delegations have been before the legislative committees this week, many of whom were from Cape Breton. Delegations from the P. W. A. and U. M. W., of Nova Scotia, had a conference to agree, if possible, on a basis of union satisfactory to both parties. I understand no agreement could be arrived at.

The first vote took place in the house yesterday, when the Government had a majority of six. Several questions were placed on the order paper. One was to determine how many soldiers are in the employ of the Government. Many men were given employment by the Government lately, and so far as can be ascertained not one was a returned soldier. All were men who had simply rendered valiant service for their party at the last local elections. The Public Accounts Committee was organized yesterday with Mr. Finn as Chairman. Hon. Mr. Faulkner introduced a resolution in favor of some Rule. Just why the Home Rule question should be discussed in the Legislature of Nova Scotia is hard to understand, as in my opinion the Government better attend to the business that comes within its jurisdiction. Home Rule is a problem that is puzzling the minds of great men like Lloyd George and Mr. Asquith. How Mr. Faulkner, a very ordinary member of the Murray Government, intends to settle it, will be determined when he moves his resolution. Several Government members like Hon. R. M. McGregor, it is said, are strongly opposed to it.

The government partially defeated Mr. Hall's bill providing for the release of the 111 soldiers. Mr. Kinley, Lunenburg, introduced his resolution, asking that Dominion Government employes be placed under the Workman's Compensation Act. Mr. Margeson submitted an amendment and in an able speech pointed out that the Local Government had never placed its own employes under the Act. The Premier admitted this and urged Mr. Kinley not to press his motion. The Workman's Compensation Bill is in committee and will probably pass the Lower House, but is slated for slaughter in the Legislative Council. 'ONLOOKER.'

Map of Aldershot.

On Monday morning a surveying party of twelve arrived at Kentville for the purpose of taking surveys and making a large scale of manoeuvring map of Aldershot and surroundings. The work will require several weeks to accomplish, and over thirty square miles will be included in the survey. The party commenced work at once on arrival, starting from the post office. All the necessary work for a large camp will be performed. The surveying party consists of M. F. Phelan, C. E. S. B. Stephens, C. E. K. Bell, J. C. Hay, M. A. Gunter, M. J. Tobin, S. J. Brown, C. R. Harris, N. David, K. R. Sommer, D. Bellefontaine and A. A. Priest.

Change in Health Act.

Among the sections of an act to amend the Public Health Act, which is before the local legislature, are the following:
Section 50 of said chapter 5 is amended by striking out subsection 2 thereof, and substituting therefor the following:
(2) The tenure of office of such medical health officer shall be during a good behaviour, and he shall be paid a salary of not less than one hundred dollars a year by the municipality or town.
Section 50 of said chapter 6 is further amended by inserting immediately after sub-section 4, the following:
4 (b) Two or more incorporated towns may, with the approval of the Governor-in-Council, by agreement provide for the appointment of one medical health officer for the towns thus combining. A medical health officer so appointed shall devote his whole time to the duties of his office.
