The Chief of the Bismarcks.
London, July 13.—Lord Harrington
arrived in London, Friday, and will confer
with Lord Salisbury and other Unionist
on Monday. An agreement has
arrived at by which Lord Salisbury
accepts Lord Harrington's Home Rule
policy, which involves the maintenance
of the full powers of the Imperial Parliament.
By its powers conferred on local ones
in Ireland are delegated, not surrendered.
Parliament, which body receives the right
control and revise the action of the country.
The appointment of judges and legal ad-
ministration are centred in the Imperial Parliament.
Lord Harrington will submit to the
Conservative ministry, although he has
himself to support positive measures and
general policy of the Conservatives.
In Gladstonian circles confidence is
pressed that the premier will confer
with his colleagues on Saturday. The
ministry say they will never accept Lord
Harrington's scheme and will fight and wait
they have secured the passage of the full
Gladstonian measure.

Lord Harrington on England's Enemies.
London, July 13.—In his speech at De-
last night Lord Harrington upbraided
members of the Government, who, he
while serving the Queen had formed an
ance with members of the Parliament
party having at least connection with a
nation whose aims were nefarious,
whose ends were obtained by nefar-
ious means. "If we yield now," he con-
cluded, "to our Irish American enemies, in order
to obtain a temporary respite, we our
selves will sooner or later have to fight
a battle over with diminished means. If
some old English judgment, fortitude,
courage and will fight and wait

Mr. Parnell Repeats the Fenians.
London, July 13.—Mr. Parnell has writ-
ten a letter in which he says "The scheme
of Lord Harrington that the Irish party
National League are in union with Ameri-
cans are untrue. I know nothing what-
soever of any Fenian organization in
America beyond what I have learned
from the newspapers. I have never had any
communication with the leaders of such
organizations or accepted any alliance with
them. I do not even know who the leaders are.
The National League and Fenians
never been proposed. If such a proposal
ever been made I should have con-
sidered it. I have always successfully ex-
posed the National League within the strict
bounds of legality. In spite of the un-
pleasant falsehoods which have partially and tempo-
rarily frustrated the movement, I shall
continue to do so, as far as possible, and
in the event of a coalition government,
I shall not resort to the brutalities of coercion."

Mr. Healy is Probably Right.
London, July 13.—At the regular fort-
nightly meeting of the National League to-day
treasurer announced that the donations
received from the United States for the Pa-
rietary Fund within the past two
months amounted to \$80,000. T. M. Healy
addressed the meeting and said that the
address said although Irishmen were dis-
appointed at the result of the election,
should not be despondent. The defeat
