## BLAME-PLACING

In a letter reprinted below, the Council of Students makes known its attitude concerning the responsibility for the lateness of the 1948-'49 Pharos.

The first paragraph of the resolution places the blame wholly on the Editor. The second ends with the statement that the Council "extended its confidence to him to an extent which appeared at the time to be reasonable". The two are hardly compatible. In the latter statement, the Council infers that it, too, took steps which were not best. With that in mind, the Council should not, in all conscience, overlook its liability in the ffair.

Hindsight is, of course, a wonderful faculty which an be used to prove the most unlikely assertions. But there is in law a doctrine known as contributory negligence, which allows courts to split the responsibility for an incident. We do not wish to prove the
Council entirely responsible Council entirely responsible ... we wish merely to ask that they accept the blame for as much of the
book's lateness as their "apparent" reason caused.
