




MISSISSAUGA TRANSIT?

## CNIB advice

Don't wear sunglasses when driving after dusk warns CNIB. Tinted glasses which cut down glare in daylight, reduce visibility after sundown. Whether or not you see traffic signals and road signs clearly may mean the difference between life and death.

Boatmen and anglers should beware of the glare of the sun's reflection on water. It can transmit enough ultraviolet light to harm the eye, causing vision to fade so gradually that the victim might not realize what was happening until too late. Sunglasses will reduce the glare warns CNIB but will not eliminate the damaging effects.

## Conservation areas expect biggest crowds this weekend

TORONTO — Recreational facilities at all 13 conservation areas administered by the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority should receive near maximum use during the coming weekend (July 18-19) as the summer holiday period reaches its peak.

More than one million persons visited the Authority areas last year and most received heaviest use during the summer months.

Here is a list of summer time facilities for the public at the Authority's other conservation areas, and their locations:

Alblon Hills; five miles north of Bolton on No. 50 Highway — group camping, family camping, swimming, fishing, nature trails and refreshment facilities.

Boyd area, just north of Woodbridge — group camping, swimming, nature trail and refreshment facilities.

Bruce's Mill, two miles east of Gormley - Stouffville road — group camping, swimming, fishing, nature trail and refreshment facilities.

Humber Trails, located south of the King City side-road just off Nobleton and

Claremont area, in Pickering Township, 1½ miles north of No. 7 Highway on No. 10 Sideroad — group camping, fishing, nature trail and refreshment facilities.

Cold Creek, located between Bolton and Nobleton on the King Sideroad — primarily for sportsmen and naturalists, has trap, rifle and archery ranges and a famous black spruce bog — also family camping, and refreshment facilities.

Glen Haffy, located near Mono Mills and No. 9 Highway — group camping, fishing, nature trail and refreshment facilities.

Greenwood area, four miles north of Pickering on the Greenwood road — group camping, swimming, fishing, nature trail and refreshment facilities.

Hart Lake, east of Brampton — group camping, swimming, boating, fishing, nature trail and refreshment facilities.

Palgrave Forest and Wild-life area, located north of No. 50 Highway to No. 25 Sideroad, west to the Humber River and north 1½ miles — fishing and nature trail.
